Death Of Captain Angus McDougall

The death occurred Tuesday evening in Charlottetown of Captain Angus MacDougall, a highly esteemed citizen and veteran seaman. He had been in poor health for the past few months, suffering from heart trouble.

Captain MacDougall who had followed the seas for more than forty years, was born at Newtown, Belfast, seventy-five years ago, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacDougall. He resided at Pownal for about thirteen years, the family removing about twenty years ago to this city, where they have been conducting the Aberdeen Hotel for a number of years and where Mrs. MacDougall died in February 1931.

Capt. MacDougall first went to sea when only sixteen years of age, making his maiden voyage on a brigantine, commanded by Captain Gavin, of Alberton.

Subsequently in his five trips around the world in sailing ships, Captain MacDougall encountered many severe storms but was only shipwrecked once.

He was one of the sturdy type of sailing ship captains of whom this Province is justly proud, and his anecdotes of experiences at sea had a perennial interest for all who were privileged to hear them.

More recently Captain MacDougall was employed as mate on the S. S. Earl Grey, the Minto, and Stanley.

The Captain was one of the prominent members of the Caledonia Club and was Pipe Major for that organization for many years, playing frequently at their various functions and other public entertainments.

He was an excellent citizen in every respect and his death will be learned with deep regret by a wide circle of friends.

He leaves to mourn one son, Daniel W., of Taunton, Mass., and two daughters Lavinia and Anna at home, and one brother, Charles MacDougall of Newtown.
