—POLAND'S FLIGHT
"Only a great wave of human sympathy can save Poland," Madame Paderewski said in New York the other day, "and we can only trust that the wave may yet come, for thus far America seems not to have fully realized what starvation means."
Madame Paderewski pictured a land laid utterly waste, where only the largest cities are standing, where 200 smaller towns have been destroyed, where 2,500 villages have been razed, where 18,000,000 people are in direct need. In the great tracts, over which the armies of both countries have passed back and forth, all is destroyed, while the only life seen is when wild dogs and other beasts scratch up the bodies of the dead.
"Picture the 400,000 'war babies,'" she said, "who are starving, the babies of mothers, who have nothing to give them but tears. A time was when there were some roots, which would furnish them with a nourishment in place of the milk which their starving mothers could not give them. But now even the beet-roots are gone, and these babies are fed on chalk and on water. Chalk and water do not nourish, they make starvation a little less painful. These starving babies and their mothers, we could reach if we had the money."
"Do you wonder that for Mr. Paderewski there is but one thought, one passion—to obtain succor for these sufferers?"
On November 5 a bazaar will be held at the Hotel Biltmore, New York, to obtain funds for the Polish Victims Relief Fund, and the dolls of Madame Paderewski, which are clever impersonations of Polish peasants, will be on sale, as well as photographs of the musical artist. Mr. Paderewski himself will auction off an autograph letter from Richard Wagner to his English publisher, a valuable writing in reference to his overture to "Rule Britannia," the manuscript of which had been mislaid.

10,000 LED TO ENLIST BY MISS CAVELL'S FATE.
LONDON, Oct. 27.—The execution by the Germans of Edith Cavell in Brussels is proving as effective an appeal for recruits as the statement issued last week by King George, according to many trained observers. The Daily News says:—
There is little doubt but that the German court which sentenced Edith Cavell to death has been responsible already for adding 10,000 men to the strength of the British Army.
"Recruiting Sergeants are unanimous in saying that Miss Cavell's heroic end has made an irresistible appeal to those men who needed some strong emotional stimulus before taking up arms, that stimulus which in the early days of the war was supplied by the overrunning of Belgium and the retreat of the British Army from Mons."

MAN CARRYING KITES.
Because of the utility and perfection of the aeroplane and observation balloon, not a great deal of use has been made in this war of man-carrying kites, the value of which the late Colonel Cody was the first to demonstrate in this country. The French army, however, is well equipped with these, while the use of kites for military work has been highly developed in the United States.
In some of the territory which the French are fighting over it has become more expedient to carry and operate war-kites than aeroplanes or balloons. The kites may be taken down and folded into a small compass and because of the lightness of their construction a small crew is able to carry the entire equipment.
Kites in the French army are used to support a cable carried aloft, on which a basket to hold the observer and his instruments is lifted. The basket used is a small model of that used on the racing balloons in trans-continental flights, and is equipped with the necessary outfit of range-finding glasses, etc.
The weight of the cable and its burden is now entrusted to one kite alone. The kites are flown in "teams" and tandem series. Thus a kite-cable may carry as many as eight or ten kites attached at proper intervals along the line. This method of flying the kites answers two purposes. It enables the lifting of the kites and the line of the most nearly perpendicular angle possible, and it divides the load so that the failure or escape of one or two kites is not fatal to the observer and his purpose.
The French method of using a travelling basket on the kite-cable enables the observer to ascend and descend without distributing the kite-



line, as was necessary with the first of the military kites.—Tit-Bits.

TWELVE INDIAN SEPOYS WERE SHOT

LONDON, England, Oct. 27.—The result of the Lahore court-martial of eighteen non-commissioned officers and troopers of the 23rd Indian Cavalry, which began in mid-August, is now announced (says the "Morning Post").
The charges against the accused were of conspiring between Oct. 15 and May 15 last to cause a mutiny in the regiment, in pursuance of which conspiracy bombs were made, telegraph wires cut, and meetings held, at which plans for the mutiny were concerted.
As an alternative charge it was urged against certain of the accused that being aware of the design to mutiny they concealed it.
The court, after an extended trial (and seventeen of the accused "Guilty" of the first charge, and sentenced them to death; and the remaining prisoner, who was found

"Guilty" on the second court, to transportation for life.
The Commander-in-Chief in confirming the finding of the courts, reduced the sentence on five of the accused to transportation for life, and commuted the life sentence of the eighteenth man to imprisonment for ten years.
The twelve men left under the penalty of death were executed on the morning of Sept. 3.
The 23rd Cavalry is a composite regiment, recruited of Sikhs, Punjabi Mohammedans, and Hindustani Mohammedans.

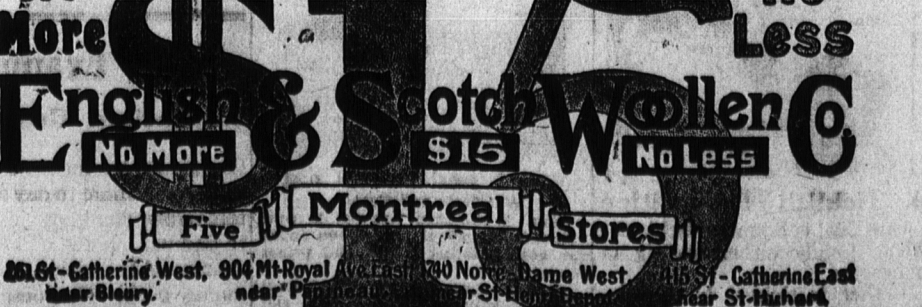
