### SOME FEATURES OF THE ELECTION CHANGES

What happened in the recent election was the shifting of votes from one party to the other. At the election of 1908 some seventeen thousand more voted for the Liberal candidates than voted for the Opposition candidates. This time there were some fifty odd thousand of a majority of votes on the Conservative side. With a popular majority three times as large as Sir Wilfrid's of three years ago, Mr Borden has but little larger majority in Parliament than the Liberal leader had. This is accounted for mainly by the large majorities given to Conservative candidates in the big cities, running up to thousands each.

The change in Prince Edward Island was but the shifting of a few hundred votes from Liberal to Conservative in Queens and Prince counties, and of a less number the other way in Kings. The net change in the popular vote was not large. And yet relatively to the whole Dominion the change was as great in this Province as it was throughout Canada. In four seats the Liberals lost one and the Conservatives gained one seat. One seat gained in four out of the total 221 seats in the House of Commons would mean a gain of fifty-five seats, or rather more than the total Con-

### THE LIBERAL FUTURE.

That staunch Liberal newspaper the Winnipeg Free Press does not share the hopes entertained in certain quarters of an early return of the Liberal party to power. It says in part: "Ontario is politically the most powerful of the Canadian Provinces and will remain so for a long time to come. If it is unanimous in any matter of public policy, or practically so, it can enforce its will upon Parliament. Ontario is strongly protectionist; and is likely to remain so. Not with its consent will there be any modification in the tariff looking to a freer interchange of goods with the United States."

"The elections are thus a complete triumph for protection. What, then is the future of the Liberals? The party has burnt its bridges so far as support from protectionists is concerned. It will never be trusted again by them. There appears to be nothing left for it but to take the other road and follow it persistently. The Liberals will be forced, by circumstances if not by inclination, to take up their old position on the tariff. This undoubtedly will involve absence from power for a long period, unless something unexpected transpires to shake the power of the Borden ministry. This is a fact that might as well be faced."

### THE PROVINCIAL SITUATION.

The present Provincial Legislature was elected in November 1908, and will not expire by limitation of law until November 1912. When elected, the party division stood 17 Liberals, 13 Conservatives.

Hon. F. L. Hazzard was then Premier. Since then he has been elevated to the Supreme Court and Hon. H. J. Palmer has become Premier.

By death or resignation of some members elected in 1908, and by subsequent by-elections the complexion of the House has been changed, and there are two vacant seats—that to which Premier Hazzard was elected in 1908 in Belfast and that to which Mr. Palmer was elected in Fort Augustus, which became vacant by his acceptance of the office of Attorney General.

The House membership as it now stands is made up of 14 Liberals and 14 Conservatives. If it were now called together, and the Speaker in the chair the Opposition would have a voting majority of one.

The leader of the Government is without a seat in the House. These are conditions that produce doubt and uncertainty in the public mind, and are not conducive to efficient Government.

The Guardian is strongly of the opinion that the existing suspense should be promptly relieved, either by bringing on the by-election in Fort Augustus and Belfast, or by a dissolution of the Legislature and a general election.

servative gain at the election. Taking this view of the case the sweeping overturn throughout the Dominion does not seem so remarkable after all. Somewhere about five per cent of the voters changed from their usual party allegiance throughout Canada. The change of seats from one party to the other in the big Provinces of Ontario and Quebec was about as great proportionately as in the other. In Quebec there was an Opposition gain of 16 in a total of 65 seats for the Province, which was as near as may be, one seat in four. In Ontario the proportion was almost exactly the same, an Opposition gain of 21 in a total of 86 seats.

In Nova Scotia the Opposition gained three seats, or one in six for the total representation of the Province, which is 18. In New Brunswick the Opposition gained three seats, where the total representation is 13, or as nearly as may be, one in four as in the big Provinces. British Columbia's solid Opposition contingent of seven members shows a gain of two seats, which repeats the proportion of one in four. The three Provinces on the prairies and Nova Scotia were the exceptions to some extent to the general rule which obtained in the other five Provinces small and large.

people here. There ought to be some official censorship provided throughout Canada to prevent the evil of which Mr Wright complains. Here we have not frequently had reason to complain. Charlottetown prefers the lean to the unclean and the fact is widely known and recognised.

Both political parties agree that Canada is prosperous. The Dominion as 54 million bushels more of wheat, 5 million bushels more of oats and 2 million bushels more barley than it had last year. Industry and trade are busy, the treasury is overflowing, peace and content prevail from the Atlantic to the Pacific. It is quite evident that we can go on for a while without reciprocity, which the people have said they do not want.
