**SHORT COURSE LECTURES**

**There Should Be No Lukewarmness Among Farmers in These Days When Up-to-Date Methods Spell Money Every Time**

(By Hon. W. M. Lea.)

The problems of the agriculturist are so many and varied as to call for the highest class of skill. Inestimable assistance has been given us by the patient, persevering scientific men who have spent a life time in studying the different forms of insect, fungus and other conditions which attack plant and animal life; and the entire human family owe a debt of gratitude to such men as Pasteur whose discovery of the antitoxin for diphtheria in cattle was said by one of France's greatest statesmen to be worth more to that country alone than the indemnity they had to pay Germany at that time. We who enjoy the benefits of the many discoveries for the treatment of destructive smuts in grains and various preventative sprays for the protection of potato plants, realize only a few of the lesser benefits bestowed upon us with-out money or without price, and which are in any measure commensurate to the value given. We have still with us a few (though this number is rapidly decreasing) who scorn the advice of an educated or trained agriculturist. They are the ones who are seldom or ever seen at our agricultural meetings. They are suspicious of the best intentions of their more progressive neighbors who are ready to cooperate with them in every movement for their community's good, and the experience of all departments of agriculture has been that those who need assistance most are hardest to reach. During the Farmers' Week we had many of the most advanced and progressive agriculturists in the province, and at all of our annual meetings familiar faces they become as we meet them from year to year. But too few yet avail themselves of the benefits to be obtained by such gatherings. The problem is how to reach those who have not yet realized their full need of future instruction or are suspicious of the source of its supply. To meet as many of the farmers who will not, or for various reasons cannot avail themselves of the benefits of short course lectures and demonstrations in agriculture given at our exhibitions and meetings in town, the Department of Agriculture have arranged a series of meetings at different parts of the province including three evening and two afternoon meetings in each locality. Lantern slides are used to illustrate desirable and undesirable farm animals. Subjects considered of greatest importance to the province and locality in which the courses are held, are conducted by men who are experienced and qualified to discuss the different problems that arise. Encouragement is given in every way to discussions by all farmers present and by this means efforts are made to bring out any valuable experience that may have been obtained by those present. It is hoped we shall continue to have good afternoon as

well as good evening attendance. While we all realize the sacrifice necessary for farmers to attend meetings in the afternoon and the desirability of holding only evening sessions, the time is limited and the requests are so many that we must push this work, and we would ask co-operation of all who are able to attend, to try and take advantage of the afternoon work, as valuable demonstrations in judging live stock classes will then be conducted if weather is suitable. If not, other practical lines will be taken up.

**A Silent Worker**

Colonel Emmet E. Clarke is one of the hard workers at Ottawa who has come out of the great war with an enhanced reputation. When the C. M. G.'s are next distributed there can be little doubt that this highly efficient administrator will have a conspicuous place on the list.

Colonel Clarke volunteered for service in the early stages of the war, but was retained in Canada on account of his superior knowledge of mechanical transport and equipment. As Director of Supplies and Transport, Colonel Clarke added initiative and vigor to a department which was vital to the successful conduct of the war. Colonel Clarke forfeited his chances for promotion on the field of battle for work-a-day duties at Ottawa, but his activities there were quite as valuable, if not as spectacular, as if he had followed a career in France and Flanders.

Colonel Clarke was in a great measure responsible for the arrangements by which four hundred thousand officers, n. c. o.'s and men were transported across continent and ocean without a single misadventure. He also had a large hand in the excellent commissariat services afforded the troops from the time of their enlistment up to their landing in the European ports and their return from overseas to their various districts in Canada.

Colonel Clarke was not without honor in foreign countries for his abilities as a transport officer. He was recently honored in the United States Senate for the excellence of his official advice on the methods pursued by the Canadian Government in the department under his control.

General Sir Sam Hughes has borne testimony in the House of Commons to Colonel Clarke's efficiency in his department. Sir Jas. Lougheed held similar opinions when Acting Minister of Militia. The present Minister of Militia, General Newburn, Adjutant-General Ashton and his other conferees on the Headquarters Staff add their word of praise.—Toronto Saturday Night.

Colonel Clarke above referred to is a brother-in-law of Senator Murphy, Tignish.

**HEAVY STORM ON NEW ENGLAND COAST**

YARMOUTH, Jan. 27.—A terrific gale and thick snow prevailed yesterday along the New England coast, and was considered one of the worst that had been experienced this season. Early yesterday afternoon Captain Ingalls, of the steamer Northland, received advices concerning the weather conditions and was ordered to hold the ship at this port for a few hours. Owing to a heavy freight and delay in train connections, the ship was not ready for sea until midnight. At that hour a blinding snow storm prevailed here, and Capt. Ingalls remained in port until one o'clock this afternoon, when she sailed with three hundred tons of freight, and one hundred passengers.

**HALF THE MONEY RAISED ALREADY**

TORONTO, Jan. 27.—Local canvassers in the Methodist National campaign in connection with the inter-church forward movement, to the number of 1,000 men and women, held a banquet in the Robert Simpson Company's store last night when it was announced that eleven Toronto Methodists had contributed \$440,000 as a starter towards the \$850,000 objective of this city, and \$1,100,000 objective of the Toronto Methodist conference.
