CANADIAN NATIONAL

GENTLEMEN ARE LIKE BLONDS — THEY BURN SO VERY EASILY

Gentlemen are like blonds. They are 20 per cent more sensitive to ultra-violet rays, which cause sunburn, than are women. Blondes are from 40 to 170 per cent more sensitive than brunettes.

Dr. Henry Laurens of Tulane University reported these observations to the Academy of Physical Medicine, in session here.

He related also that pregnant women, persons with unstable nervous systems, overactive thyroid glands, high blood pressure or active tuberculosis show increased sensitivity to sunburn.

In a message to the academy last night, President Roosevelt advocated special attention to "the problem of the crippled and defective child."

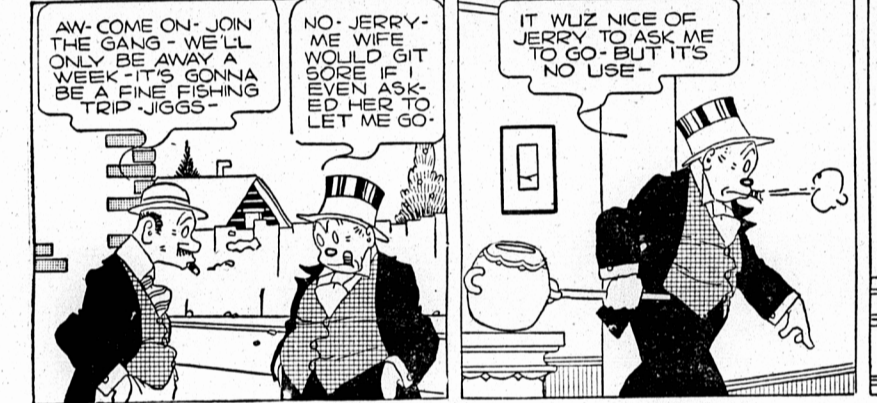

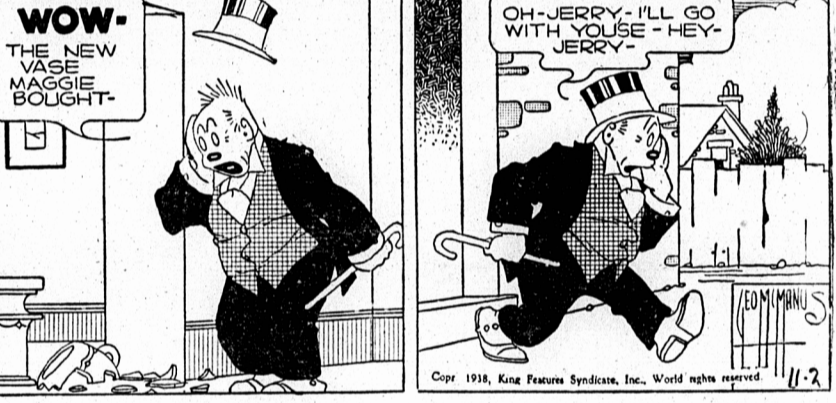

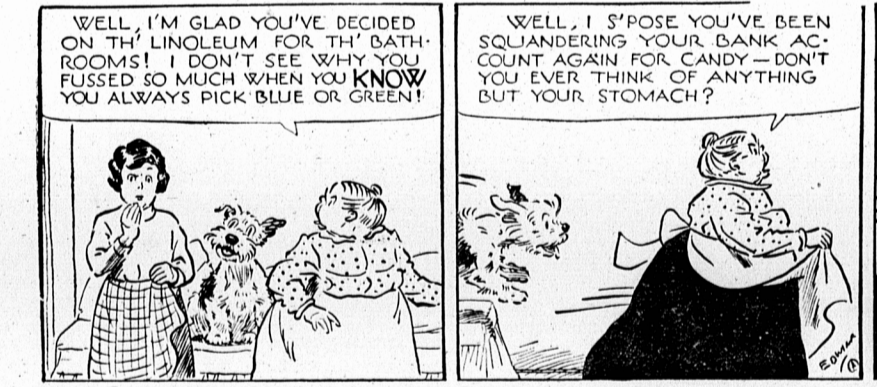
