



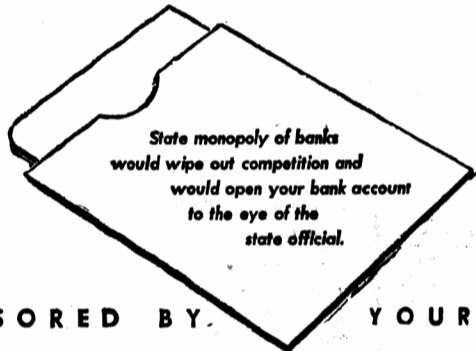
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Amendment At Liberal Convention

MONCTON, N. B., May 17—(CP)—Liberals received a shock at the Westmorland County Liberal Association convention here Saturday, which saw E. W. George of Upper Sackville nominated as Liberal candidate. The hall was crowded and balloting had just got under way.

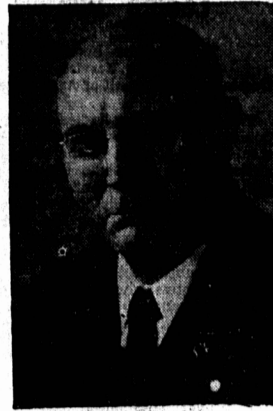
In the pause that elapsed while votes were counted resolutions were brought in reaffirming the meeting's faith in the Liberal party and other customary resolutions. Support to Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent was passed unanimously as was that to Hon. J. B. McNair, provincial premier. Then came a resolution that a telegram be sent to William Lyon Mackenzie King lauding him for the staunch leadership he had given the Liberal party for nearly thirty years.

"Mr. Chairman, came a voice from the audience, 'I would like to make an amendment.' The crowd was tense—what amendment could there be to so glowing a tribute. Then the speaker went on, 'I would like a telegram to be sent also to another great Liberal, Sir Wilfrid Laurier.' No action was taken.

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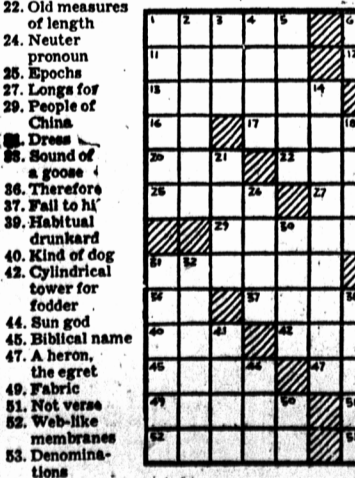

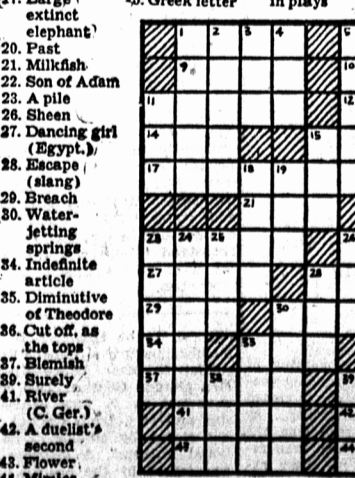
