REDUCTION IN CABLE CHARGES-
 As a result of recent negotia-
 tions a further reduction in the
 Cable rate to points in the West In-
 dies and South America has been in-
 augurated by the Canadian National
 Telegraphs, from Offices in Prince
 Edward Island. The average de-
 crease is three cents per word and
 the places involved in the reduction
 include Cuba, Bermuda, Trinidad,
 St. Thomas, St. Kitts, Buenos Aires,
 etc. This reduction has been made
 in an endeavor to provide adequate
 telegraphic service at a minimum
 cost and is of especial advantage to
 potato shippers who negotiate sales,
 particularly to Cuba, entirely by
 wire. There is no delay on messages
 handled under the reduced rate, and
 the saving of time is an important
 factor in handling perishable com-
 modities, such as potatoes. When it
 will be recalled that these messages
 are handled between Cuba and this
 province in well under ten minutes,
 as compared with approximately a
 week by mail, the advantages of this
 further reduction in rates can be
 realized.

**WEST OF ENGLAND FLOUR
 TRADE**
 Reports from Bristol, written by
 Douglas S. Cole, Canadian Trade
 Commissioner for the forthcoming
 issue of the Commercial Intellig-
 ence Journal, state that the buy-
 ers of flour in all the western
 ports are very careful, and are only
 stocking what is essential for their
 immediate needs. They still have a
 particular liking for Canadian
 flours, these being more popular
 than the flours mixed at Buffalo
 from Canadian-wheats in bond.
 The market, however, is being sought
 aggressively by a great many coun-
 tries, and some are outbidding Can-
 ada to a surprising extent. France,
 for instance, with her import reg-
 ulations, was able to offer flour re-
 cently at \$2.92 c. i. f., against the
 Canadian price of around \$4.74.
 English offers are fairly low, and
 the market for Australian flour has
 been considerably extended by the
 exchange situation. Hungarian offers
 flour sporadically on this market, war.

MRS. T. D. HART
 (Sackville Tribune, Nov. 9)
 Mrs. T. D. Hart, one of Sackville's
 oldest citizens, passed peacefully
 away at her home, Weldon Street,
 on Friday last. Deceased, who was
 in her 92nd year, was before her
 marriage Miss Charlotte Dixon,
 daughter of the late Charles Dixon,
 whose grandfather came to Canada
 from Yorkshire, England, in 1772
 and settled in Sackville, Miss Dixon,
 who was born in Sackville, June 9th,
 1840, was one of the first pupils to
 enter the old "Female Academy,"
 now the Ladies' College, when it
 was opened on August 17th, 1854.
 In 1864 Miss Dixon married Rev.
 T. D. Hart and for nearly thirty
 years was an ideal minister's wife
 in the different circuits in which her
 husband was stationed in Nova
 Scotia. In 1892 Mr. and Mrs. Hart
 settled in Sackville. Mr. Hart passed
 away some years ago.

The late Mrs. Hart is survived by
 nine children. The daughters are:
 Dr. Louise Hart, in India; Miss
 Elizabeth Hart, former missionary
 in Japan, now at home; Mrs. (Rev.)
 E. C. Hennigar, in Japan; Mrs. J.C.
 Spencer, now at home; Mrs. Thom-
 as Moyle, Central Bedeque, P.E.I.;
 Miss Lillian Hart, R. N., at home.
 The sons are: Rev. Arthur Hart,
 pastor of the United Church, Mala-
 gash, N.S.; Dr. Fred Hart, Moose
 Jaw, Sask., and Dr. E. R. Hart,
 Sackville.

Many friends attended the fun-
 eral which was held from the home
 on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
 Rev. Dr. J. H. Philp, pastor of the
 Sackville United Church, presided
 and was assisted by Rev. Dr. E. R.
 Brecken, who led in prayer. Dr.
 Philp read the Scripture and spoke
 briefly of the beautiful Christian
 life of the deceased, who had been
 referred to as "the mother of mis-
 sionaries," several of her daughters
 having served for many years as
 foreign missionaries. He referred to
 his pleasant association with the
 family since his pastorate in Sack-
 ville. Dr. Philp spoke of the cheery
 and courageous manner in which
 the late Mrs. Hart had faced the
 infirmities of advancing years. After
 her slight fall, she learned to read
 by the touch system and continued
 to take a keen interest in everyday
 affairs. Through her daughters who
 had served as missionaries in the
 foreign field, Mrs. Hart's influence
 had been spread abroad.

Rev. Dr. Brecken had charge of
 the service at the graveside. Inter-
 ment was in the Rural cemetery.
 The pall-bearers were: Coll. Donald
 and Herbert Hart, of Sackville, and
 Gordon Hart, of Malagash, N. S.,
 grandsons of the deceased. Rev.

 ery of rich mercury and gold de-
 posits in the isolated high Sierra
 Mountains were reported today. A
 despatch from Durango said an
 extremely rich mercury find had

 NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 12
 -The government patrol boat Ad-

 the lighthouse keeper there. Accom-
 panying Inspector Dan Nicholson
 of the Nova Scotia police, was a
 young man, a resident of the Island
 who, the Inspector said, had come
 to North Sydney voluntarily pend-
 ing the clearing up of charges that
 he had assaulted Mrs. Gwinn dur-
 ing her husband's shore leave and
 when the temporary light-keeper
 was absent.

Inspector Nicholson with Constable

 to the Island a few days ago
 when assistance was requested by
 wireless. Mrs. Gwinn, who had
 been in delicate health, was found
 to be in such condition that im-
 mediate hospital treatment was im-
 perative, and her story will not be told
 until she has recovered.

Suggests Revision

Of Reparations

(Canadian Press)
 CALGARY, Alta., Nov. 12-Neces-
 sity of revision of reparations for
 international prosperity was em-
 phasized here last night by Rt. Hon.
 Arthur Meighen, former Canadian
 Prime Minister, in an address to a
 joint gathering of the Canadian and
 Service clubs. Despite the advance
 of Nations to sounder footing than
 ten years ago, bitterness still pre-
 vailed and must be eliminated
 through reparations alterations, he
 declared.

BOYS TRAPPED

ON TRESTLE
ARE KILLED

(Canadian Press)
 DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 12-As a
 freight train and a passenger train
 coming from opposite directions
 swept onto a double tracked trestle
 over the river Rouge yesterday they
 trapped six boys who were walking
 across the structure.

One of the boys, Oscar Filpart,
 10, was killed by the passenger train
 and two others, Oscar Schronk, 11
 and Robert Rear, 12, jumped into
 the river and were drowned. The
 other three, James Carter, 12, his
 brother Carl 8, and Robert Alandt
 12, escaped death by hanging from
 a railing at the side of the trestle.
 The boys were on their way from
 their homes in the suburb of River
 Rouge to Woodmere Cemetery to
 visit the grave of the Filpart boy's
 mother.
