REVOLTING ORGIES AMONG CANNIBALS.

Rev. Dr. G. Patton, Who Visited P. E. Island Some Years Ago, Describes Horrors in the South Sea Islands.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 11.—One of the passengers by the Warimoo, which arrived from Australia this morning, was Rev. Dr. G. Patton, who is bound for Washington as a delegate from the Colony of Victoria to the Pan-Presbyterian Convention. While in America Mr. Patton will endeavor to enlist aid for the cause of still further extending the work of civilizing the natives of the New Hebrides, or South Sea Islands. "There are thirty islands in the group," said Mr. Patton, "with a population of probably 40,000 natives. Originally these people were cannibals, and to this day there are thousands of them who still practice this awful crime. Bloody conflicts between the natives of different islands are still of frequent occurrence, and they are always followed by the most revolting

orgies, at which the prisoners taken in battle are killed and eaten."

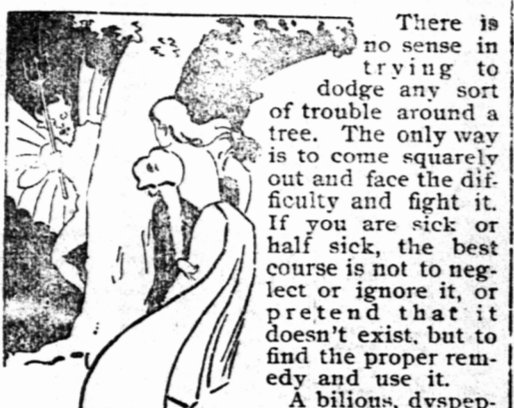
EIGHT THOUSAND CONVERTS.

"Twenty-two of the islands are now practically under Christian influence, missions having 8,000 converts and over 3,000 church members. The scriptures have been translated into twenty-two different languages, each island in the group having a distinct language of its own. We have three hundred native preachers and teachers are extending our work all the time. "There are twenty-three white missionaries now in the islands and seven lay helpers, including three women. The missions are maintained by a federation of seven Presbyterian churches in Scotland, Nova Scotia, New Zealand, Tasmania and Australia."

BICYCLE RIDERS MEET OCEANIC NOW IN NEW YORK.

Two Men on Tandem Beyond Control.

New York, Sept. 12.—Bicyclists riding in what is known as the boulevard loop leading from West 42nd street through West New York, were thrown into a panic Sunday afternoon by a runaway tandem, driven by two young men from this city. The machine, going at a speed entirely beyond control of its riders, dashed against an electric light pole, and Eugene Hauck was instantly killed, while his companion, Charles Heilmann was dangerously injured.

The Steamer is 24 Feet Longer With a Horse Power over 37,000 Greater Than the Great Eastern.

New York, Sept. 13.—The great steamer Oceanic, of the White Star Line, was sighted east of Fire Island at eight o'clock this morning. She left Queenstown at 12.45 p. m. last Thursday, and estimating she will reach the lights at ten o'clock, the time of her passage will be about 6 days 2 hours. It is probable that, owing to her great draught she will not attempt to cross the bar till high water, which is at half past one this afternoon at Sandy Hook, so her appearance in the upper bay can hardly be expected before three o'clock. The time made by the Oceanic may be considered very good, as heavy gales have been reported on the Atlantic during her passage, and compares favorably with that of the ocean greyhounds in such weather. As compared with ocean records, however, there are a half dozen steamers on the Queens-town route westward ahead of her. The best is that of the Lucania, 5 days 7 hours and 23 minutes, and Teutonic, 5 days 16 hours and 31 minutes, next following being the Campana, Umbria, Majestic and Euribia.

LARGEST EVER BUILT.

The Oceanic is the largest vessel ever built. Her dimensions are 704 feet long, 72 ft. beam and 68 ft. depth with draught, light, of 22 feet, and loaded 32 1-2 feet. She registered 17,000 tons. Her engines were designed to develop 45,000 horse-power. Her coal capacity is about 6,000 tons. She consumes about 500 tons of coal daily. The ship has two funnels, each of twenty feet diameter and 80 feet above the fire grates. Her passenger accommodation is for 625 cabin and 1,000 steerage, and she carries a crew of 450 men. It was built when she sailed from Queenstown on the present trip that she had on board 2,044 souls.

BUILT A NEW D. C. K.

So much larger is she than the other White Star steamers that the line built a new dock on North River to accommodate her. The Oceanic's displacement is 30,000 tons. Compared with the Great Eastern, the greatest ship ever built before her. She is twenty feet longer and with a horse-power over 37,000 more. The Great Eastern, which was built on the Thames in 1859

TOOK POISON FROM A QUACK.

Young Woman in Woodstock Drugged After Receiving a Number of Unsigned Notes.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 13.—A young woman living in Oxford street, named Lafim, was taken violently ill about 6.30 last night, and a doctor was summoned. There were symptoms of poisoning. The doctor worked over her for several hours and finally got her out of danger. When she recovered she related a remarkable story. Yesterday morning, she said, while she was alone in the house, she received two notes, which were brought by boys, asking her to go to Victoria Park in the afternoon, to meet some one. The notes were not signed. Some time after noon a stranger, a tall, dark man came to the door. He said he was a medicine pedlar. He pushed his way into the house, and as he got inside he told the girl she was looking ill and that he had something

to cure her. She got a spoon and he poured out some red liquid, which she drank. The moment she had done so the stranger laughed into her face, and seizing the two notes which were lying on the cupboard, hurriedly went away. The girl says she felt strangely, but went up town. She became so weak that she could hardly walk, and when she got home she was worse. She had severe pains in her stomach and had just time to run out and call for the neighbors when she became unconscious. She says she received threatening letters and believes some parties have formed a conspiracy to murder her. She is rather a good-looking girl and intelligent. The police are working now on the case.

Dr. Borden Defends General Hutton.

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—Hon. Dr. Borden, minister of militia, on being interviewed to-day, regarding the rumor published in the papers here to the effect that Major General Hutton had drawn his pen through the name of Col. Mason, of Toronto, which appeared on the list of honorary aides de camp to the Governor General, said there is no truth in the statement. "I am quite sure that the action of Major General Hutton is falsely attributed," said Dr. Borden.
