A THING OF FLUFFS AND FRILLS.

The separate waist, be it of the lingerie or silk variety, is fluffiness and frilliness personified. While the lingerie waist certainly holds the centre of the stage, it has by no means moved to the wall the waist of chiffon or thin silks. Double chiffon particularly is in high favor for these little separate blouses, and by double chiffon we mean not the double cloth width in measure, but rather a quality of unusual strength; in fact, this double chiffon will stand a nice suds bath and look none the worse for it. The model shown has a deep square yoke, finished with a frill of lace and braid effect. To this yoke the blouse bodice of the chiffon is attached in full shirring, and laid from the yoke to nearly the waistline in deep shirred tucks. Embroidery ornaments the bretelles and yoke straps, and covers the bands on the puff sleeves just above the elbow. A frill of the chiffon, overlaid with a ruffle of the lace, finishes the sleeve. The face is a creamy tint, the chiffon a rose pink faint in its single width, but giving charming shade effects in the double tucks.

ECKARDT COY BUY NEW SITE

In Toronto and Will Oust 11 Firms—Get 300 Feet on Niagara Street—Will Also Have Warehouses Opposite Union Depot.

(Toronto World.)

The numerous outside towns looking for the establishment of the factories of the Eckardt Casket Co. and the Eckardt Silver Plate Co. in their midst are to be disappointed, as a big real estate deal has just been put through which determines that these concerns will stay in Toronto.

Over 300 feet of property on the south side of Niagara-street, east of Tecumseth-street corner, has been purchased by Eckardt from the Ontario Power and Light Co., the consideration being in the neighborhood of \$100,000. There are seven buildings on the property, covering about 800 feet of space, and the firms that will have to vacate to make room are the Palmer Piano Co., Mason & Risch Piano Co., United Electric Co., Barthelmas Piano Action Co., W. Bohn & Co., piano, key manufacturers; Spence & Co., Gilchrist & Co. contractors; Collieran Mattress Co., Toronto Woodworking Co., Carlyle Manufacturing Co., and American Autoharp Co. Their leases have nearly expired, and negotiations for the sale of the property have been pending for over a month.

Mr. Eckardt says his firms will take possession as soon as possible, and that the premises already on the ground will suit their requirements, and will give them one-third larger floor space. There is 400 horse-power capacity twin engine, 8000 boiler capacity, and 125,000 feet capacity for dry kiln. There are five railway switches on the premises, one runs into the main building direct over to the planning mill and dry kiln, two in the yards to pile lumber on both sides and one into the coal bin.

The premises are near the foot of Bathurst-street, and only five blocks from the union station. A warehouse, office and showrooms will be established almost opposite the union depot.

It is understood that Mason & Risch will move into new premises behind the Princess Theatre.

(This firm is well known throughout the province by its representative who visits here each season.)

SOUTH KING'S SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Southern King's Sunday School Association met in the Presbyterian Church, Murray River, on Thursday, June 8th. at 2 p. m.

The Convention was opened by Rev. S. D. McPhee. The Vice Presidents, George Moore presided. Report of acting Secretary Miss Adella Horton was read and adopted. After the usual committees were appointed, brief reports were received from representatives of the various Sunday Schools of the district. There being three dormant schools, Revs. D. W. Crandall, S. D. McPhee and Josiah Roberts, Esq., were appointed a committee to endeavor to reconstitute them.

The Convention pledged the District to raise \$50 in aid of the Provincial Association and appointed a financial committee to take measures to collect the same.

This committee should have the sympathy and co-operation of the Sunday schools of this district.

Rev. A. D. Archibald, Field Secretary gave an address, exemplified on the black-board on "How to Study the Lesson" which should be a practical benefit to many. The evening session was opened by a Præface Service led by Rev. Mr. Archibald.

The report of nominating committee was confirmed by the election of the following officers:— President, George Moore, Murray River.

Vice Presidents—John McDonald, Josiah Roberts, W. L. McLean. Sec-Treasurer, D. A. McLeod, Alliston.

The Field Secretary then gave an address on "The Mission of the Sunday School." He maintained the work of the Sunday School should not be confined to teaching the young alone but adults as well should have their instruction.

Rev. D. W. Crandall gave an address demonstrating the expediency of teaching Temperance in the Sunday School. He emphasized the responsibility of parents in setting a good example before their children.

The closing address by Rev. S. D. McPhee on "How to win souls to Christ" was an impressive and eloquent appeal to fellow Christians to direct others to Christ, the Saviour who should be our best example in life.

The enthusiasm and solemnity of the services was greatly enhanced by the harmonious and hearty singing of the chorals.

A pleasing feature of the service was a well rendered musical solo by Mrs. D. W. Crandall.

A hearty vote of thanks being given the people of Murray River for their hospitality and efforts to make the Convention a success this session closed with the benediction.
