**No Extension of The Recruiting Limit**

**OFFICERS TO RETURN TO CANADA**

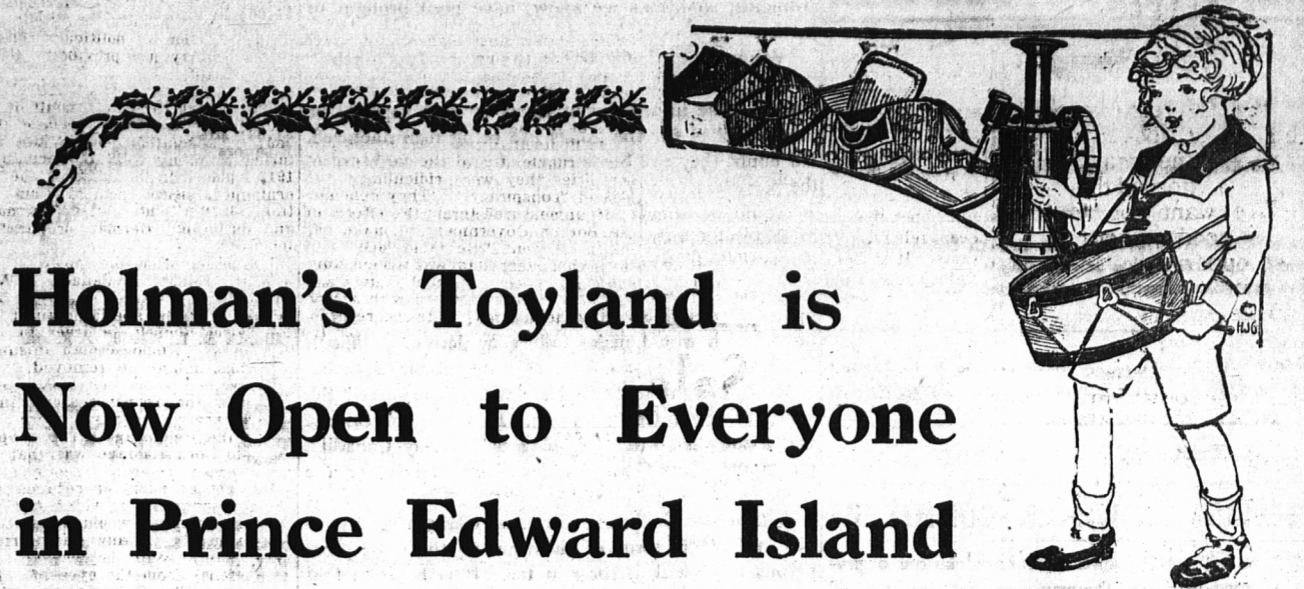

**ITALIANS ARE ENTERING THE BALKAN CAMPAIGN.**

VIENNA, Dec. 8.—Official reports have been received to the effect that the Italian forces had been landed at Avlona, Albania, to enter the Balkan campaign with the Entente Allies, and today's report of the putting ashore of munitions and of artillery attacks from shore against the Austrian warships seemingly give verity to them.

**ROME, Dec. 7.—(7.45 p.m.)—**The American oil steamer Comunitipaw has been sunk by a submarine in the Mediterranean near Tobruk, Tripoli. No information has been received concerning the crew, or the nationality of the submarine.

**FORMATION OF NEW CABINET IN SPAIN.**

MADRID, Dec. 8.—Uncertainty still prevails as to the formation of the new cabinet. The dominant impression is that a non-partisan ministry will be organized following yesterday's resignation of the Dato Cabinet, although the Liberal press considers it possible that Count Romanones, former Premier, may be recalled to power. The Republican journals allude to Spain as surrounded by dangers in the presence of unknown perils.

**FRENCH SUBMARINE DESTROYED THE CREW CAPTURED.**

PARIS, Dec. 8.—"According to a German radiogram, the French submarine Fresnel was destroyed on Dec. 5 by an Austrian warship," says a communication issued today at the Marine Ministry.

"Two officers and twenty-six men were captured."

The Fresnel, built in 1909, was 167 feet long, of 392 tons displacement above water. She had six torpedo tubes. Her normal complement was twenty-four men.
