Potatoes Good Poultry Feed

Small unmerchantable potatoes may very profitably be fed to poultry. In an experiment planned to compare boiled potatoes with corn meal in the laying mash at the Fredericton, N. B. Experimental Station, it was found that the potato fed pens did even better than when corn meal was used in the mash.

Each group was fed a scratch mixture of two parts of cracked corn, two parts wheat, and one part oats. One group received a dry mash containing equal parts of corn meal, wheat bran, wheat middlings and crushed oats. The other group received a moist mash consisting of equal parts of wheat bran, wheat middlings and crushed oats mixed with boiled potatoes. The proportions fed were two parts potatoes and one part mash. Each group received charcoal grit, milk, green feed and water.

The experiment ran from the first of December until the end of May in each of three years. The average egg production for the six month periods for the three years was 82.3 for the corn meal fed lot as compared with 88.69 when the potatoes were fed. The potato feeding also showed an advantage in hatching results, as it is shown in the Report of the Station for 1928, published by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, that in all the matings the hatches were higher from the birds, both male and female, that received potatoes instead of corn meal in the mash.
