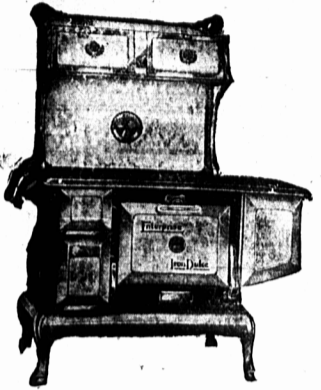
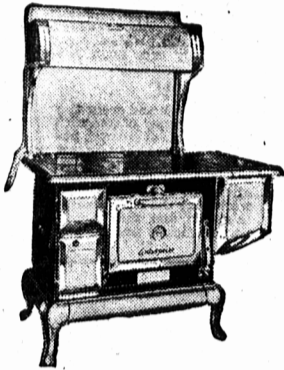

N.B. Guide Wins At Moose Calling

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 14—(C. P.) At the age of 73, Arthur Pringle, of Stanley, N. B., has won his first moose-calling contest and is now champion of North America. He was tactful about the victory when passing through Saint John on his return from a fishing show and guides' contest at Boston, but other guides were more communicative regarding the contest in which Pringle defeated some 60 moose-callers from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, British Columbia, Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire.

Veteran of 45 seasons in the woods, the victorious guide had staged many successful calling battles with the lords of New Brunswick forests but had never tried his talent against that of other guides in an official contest.

After a series of eliminations the field at Boston dwindled to three: Pringle and two Maine Indians, one a woman. Honors finally rested between the only woman entrant and Pringle, and after another try the New Brunswicker was awarded the championship by a slight margin.

The elderly guide merely smiled, when interrogated here as to the secret of his success. Plainness, teasing and other qualities entered the art, another guide remarked, "because he is the best liar in moose language."
