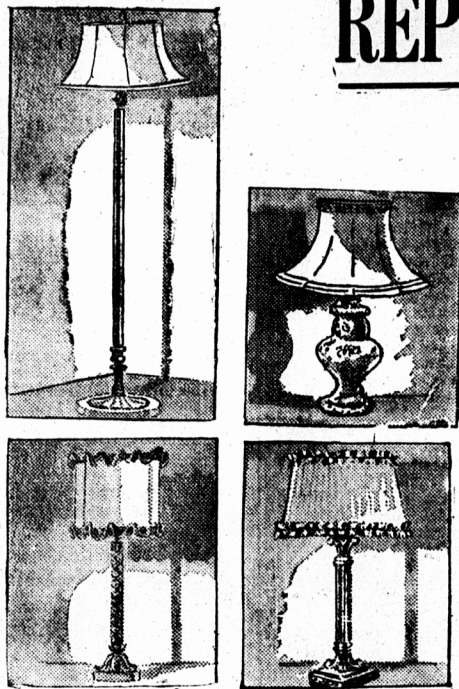

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### Contract Bridge

A Fine Distinction  
The declarer made his game contract in today's deal by drawing the fine distinction between a king and a queen as the probable basis of an opponent's bid.

West dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.

West led the king, queen and ace of diamonds, then shifted to the ten of hearts.  
Declarer thought for a long time over his play from dummy on this trick. He saw, of course, that he would not have to risk the heart finesse if the club queen was in West's hand, subject to a finesse. (Obviously, West would have to have the spade king, in any case, for the contract to be makeable, but this was almost a foregone conclusion in view of the opening notrump.)  
After long deliberation, declarer ducked the heart lead in dummy. He was, of course, gratified to win with his own jack, and now when the spade finesse succeeded it was all over, since declarer could easily discard his losing club on the heart ace.  
South's choice of hearts finesse instead of the club finesse was (as he explained) based on his estimate of what West must have held for his vulnerable notrump opening. The A-K-Q of diamonds, plus the spade king and the club queen, without the heart king, would have given West only three bare honor-tricks, and knowing West's bidding style, South felt that he would not have opened with one notrump. The heart king, however, instead of or in addition to the club queen, would have made West's bid at least reasonable, and it was on that basis that South made his winning decision.
