CANUCKS MORE SATISFIED WITH U. N. THAN ARE EITHER YANKS OR AUSSIES

Three-Nation Poll Compares Public's View Of Progress

By Canadian Institute of Public Opinion

TORONTO, June 12 - The general public of United States, like that of Australia, shows more dissatisfaction with the accomplishments of the United Nations than does the Canadian public.

In all three countries, however, a joint opinion survey, carried out by the affiliated Gallup Poll organizations, shows a sizeable segment of the general public dissatisfied.

Basis of the joint survey was an identically worded question: "Are You Satisfied or Dissatisfied With the Progress Made to Date by the United Nations Organization?"

This question was asked by trained interviewers of a typical sample of the adult population (over 21 years) in the three countries. It will be seen from the table below that about one in three persons in United States and Australia are dissatisfied, while over a quarter in

Canada are dissatisfied. In the two British countries, the public tends to be less definite (i.e. more undecided) than the American public:

In the Canadian survey, those who expressed an opinion were asked to give a reason. Greatest cause of dissatisfaction is the obvious one: "Too much talking and squabbling, and not enough action."

Among those who were dissatisfied, the Spanish question was referred to fairly frequently. Many contrary views were expressed in connection with Russia, some voters taking the stand that U. N. had not been firm enough with Russia, or "catered too much to Russia," while others took the reverse position, claiming that the British and American representatives had "not tried to get along with Russia."

The survey found that Canadian voters are much more undecided than are the men, indicating less interest in, or familiarity with the international scene:

Nine Students To Attend Conference

TORONTO, June 11 - (CP) - Nine Canadian university students will sail from Halifax for the United Kingdom July 1 as delegates to the International Student Service conference at Cambridge University.

The conference, which will run from July 22-26, Gordon Campbell, Canadian executive secretary of the I. S. S., announced that the group will tour war-stricken areas in Europe during August along with delegates from more than 30 other countries.

The delegates, their home towns and universities include: June Wrone, Ottawa, University of Toronto; Guy Roeder, Montreal, president of the Montreal Federation of Catholic Students; Montreal University; Fernand Cadieux, Three Rivers, Que.; Laval University; Ronald Crosby, Yarmouth, N.S. president of the Students' Union at Acadia University.

The conference, first since 1939, will study problems of universities and students throughout the world, and activities of the I. S. S. which has its headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland.
