THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON

Special to the Guardian.

TORONTO June 3rd.—Moderate westerly and southwesterly winds fair not much change in temperature.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure, was forty-eight degrees above zero and with a southern exposure was forty-six.

THE WEATHER—Yesterday it rained heavily from morning until 4 o'clock, accompanied by disagreeable gusts of northwest wind, clearing in the evening and continuing at all night.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was fifty-nine degrees above zero and the lowest was forty-nine. The lowest previous night was forty-nine above. At nine a. m. it was fifty-two above, and at nine p. m. it was forty-nine above.

The tide will be high this morning at 9, tomorrow at 9:37, and Wednesday at 10:34, tomorrow at 11:29, and Thursday at 12.

The sun sets this evening at 7:46, tomorrow at 7:46 and Thursday at 7:47; it rises tomorrow and Wednesday at 4:10 and Thursday at 4:09.

The moon sets tonight at 7:05 and tomorrow at 8:17.

The last quarter of the moon was on Tuesday, May 27th, at 3:04 p. m. There will be a new moon on Wednesday, June 4th, at 3:57 p. m.

The length of today will be fifteen hours and thirty-one minutes and of tomorrow fifteen hours and thirty-four minutes.
