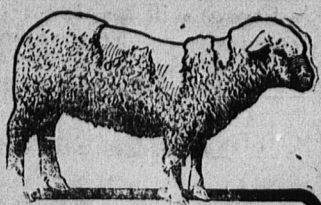

Her many friends here will be pleased to learn that Miss Adel Gordon of Charlottetown, who arrived home Saturday, has made a splendid record, taking first rank in bacteriology, chemistry, English nutrition and honorable mention in home nursing; also receiving her honorary diploma.

PHOTOGRAPHED.—Saturday's Halifax Herald reproduces a group photograph of No. 1 Platoon Divisional Cyclist Corps, in splendid body of men recruited in the Maritime Provinces; two-thirds being university men of which nine are from King and six from Dalhousie. Eight of the cyclist since they enlisted were offered commissions in other corps, but among them are the following: P. E. Islands, James E. Lockerby, Malpeque and Benj. C. Salter, Charlottetown.

NEW POST CARD.—The post Office Department has issued a Two Cent Post Card to cover both the postage and the War Tax, which undoubtedly affords greater convenience than the One Cent Card and it is the desire of the Department that the public be encouraged to put this card into general use. It is not however the intention to prohibit the use of the ordinary One Cent Card to which a War Tax or One Cent Stamp has been affixed, but its use should be restricted as much as possible to Third Class matter.

BIG LOBSTER CATCH.—A great lobster catch is reported from Escuminac. The boats are taking lobsters faster than the factories can pack them, and part of the catch goes to P. E. Island and other canneries. One boat of Harrison Smith's fleet brought in 4,400 Saturday. Mr. Smith, a man from Escuminac says, he put 9,000 live lobsters that he couldn't pack at the time in a boat and sank her, to keep the fish alive till he could use them, says the Chatham World.

ISLAND NURSES.—Word has been received by Mr. Frederick D. Beers, of the Marine Department, that his daughter Viola is sailing with the unit organized by Harvard College to serve in a British Base Hospital of 1,040 beds. Another Island nurse who is also sailing is Miss Eleanor Gordon, of Framingham Hospital, a graduate of Newton, Mass., Hospital. Miss Gordon is a daughter of the late Walter F. Gordon, of Brudenell River. The party, including 32 surgeons and 75 nurses, will leave Boston June 21st, via the Fall River boat, sailing from New York the following day on the Holland-American Liner Noordam for Falmouth, Eng., whence they will be assigned to duty. It is expected that they will be placed for service in some hospital in England, though there is a possibility that they will be sent to the Continent possibly to Boulogne.

Owing to the very limited quantity of hogs now available, Davis & Fraser have notified their buyers that they intend discontinuing packing for this season on Saturday, June 12th inst. This means that hogs from the country points would need to be delivered to shippers not later than Friday, 10th. Hogs will be bought at the packing-house as usual on every day up to and including the 12th. Buying will be resumed, as in other seasons, early in September. The outlook at present is for high prices by that time, and farmers could hardly make any mistake in having all hogs possible ready for market early this coming fall.

Drill will be as follows: Number two and three company this Tuesday evening and number one, Thursday night. It is up to the two hundred and fifty members, who volunteered their services and signed the roll to turn out, and make themselves proficient with the rifle, and get into line for any service that may be required. The painstaking and faithful officers, are more than willing to instruct the men, but it is hard to do this when the majority of the members absent themselves from the weekly drills of but one hour. Let each Home Guard take these matters to heart, and not only be present, but try and enlist others for service overseas, or at home. To the few members who have not missed a turn out for over six months would say the officers appreciate their faithfulness and hope there will be large turn outs, this week. The service roll will be at Drill Hall for any citizens to sign Tuesday and Thursday evening.

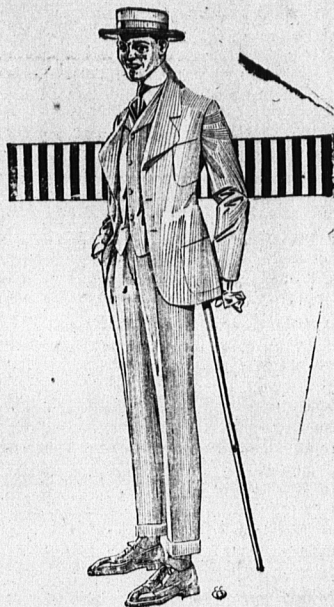
