PREMIER MEIGHEN HAS MESSAGE FOR THINKERS

Given Tremendous Ovation at Truro, Where He Shows up Hypocrisy of Opposition.

TRURO, N. S., Aug. 24.—Crowds that overflowed the Princess Theatre and spread out into a nearby field heard Premier Arthur Meighen, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Militia, and Hon. P. B. McCurdy, Minister of Public Works, expound the policies of the new National Liberal and Conservative Government here tonight, and show why, in their judgment, the last named should be returned over Hugh Dickson, United Farmers' candidate, in the Colchester by-election of September 20.

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BOLSHEVIKI FLEEING IN PRECIPITATE FLIGHT

80,000 Prisoners Taken by Poles to Date. Bolsheviki With Wives and Children Fleeing Across the Border, Hungry and Starving. Germans Established Soup Kitchens to Feed Women and Children

Gen. Wrangel Makes Important Captures.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 27.—General Wrangel's forces marching inland from Novorossisk, have captured Ekaterinodar, according to unofficial advices received here today. Novorossisk is a port on the Black Sea in Caucasia; Ekaterinodar is an important railway junction on the River Kuban 75 miles inland.

MOSCOW, August 27.—The Bolsheviki have launched a counter-attack designed to re-capture Brest Litovsk. It was officially announced today. "We are fiercely attacking Brest Litovsk forts," an official communique said.

BERLIN, August 27.—Famine and desolation are following in the wake of the panic stricken flight of the Bolsheviki troops who are crossing the frontier into East Prussia by thousands.

BERLIN, August 27.—Many of the men are accompanied by their wives and children whom they said they were forced to bring with them on the invasion of Poland or they would have starved to death while the men were fighting at the front.

Indescribable scenes are being enacted along the border, according to dispatches from press correspondents. German officials established soup kitchens to take care of starving emaciated Russians. Men, women and children were screaming and fighting, scrambling over each other in the rush for these rations like pigs fighting at a food trough, one correspondent said.

WARSAW, August 27.—Eighty thousand prisoners have been taken by the Poles to date an official communication announced today. "South of the Dniester and along the left bank of the Bug we are pursuing the Bolsheviki," the statement said.

LLOYD GEORGE RETURNING FROM HOLIDAY TOUR

To Supervise Efforts of Government to Prevent Miners' Strike. In Nation Wide Vote Majority Favor Immediate Strike.

LONDON, August 27.—Premier Lloyd George will return to England at once from Lucerne to supervise the efforts of the Government to prevent a nation wide coal strike according to reports in official circles. The latest figures compiled here in a nation wide ballot by the miners showed 100,804 in favor of striking and 28,471 opposed.

McSweeney Still Lives.

DUBLIN, Aug. 27.—Replying to appeal of the Irish Peace Conference on behalf of Lord Mayor MacSweeney, Home Secretary Shortt telegraphed today: "I am sorry, decision is decision of Cabinet and I cannot alter it."

TAKING PRECAUTIONS TO GUARD MAYOR MCSWEENEY

Cordon of Military Thrown Around Prison. Intense Feeling Aroused in England and Ireland Over His Impending Death

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, August 27.—A cordon of troops were thrown about Brixton prison today. The military took this action after the discovery that a number of persons demonstrating for the release of Lord Mayor MacSweeney (Cork), were armed with revolvers and bombs. The soldiers and police promptly charged and broke up every group that gathered in the vicinity of the prison. Several additional arrests were made. After visiting Lord Mayor this morning his wife and his sister Annie said his death was imminent.

INTENSE FEELING AROUSED.

LONDON, August 27.—The effect of the hunger strike of Lord Mayor MacSweeney of Cork, upon the political situation in both Ireland and England was believed today to be slowly breaking down the official opposition to his release. Not only has the approaching death of the Lord Mayor, who has been on a hunger strike in Brixton prison for more than two weeks, created a serious crisis in Ireland but radical and labor elements in England are beginning to make it their fight are growing more bitter against the Government.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Father Dominic interviewed by the Associated Press regarding Howard Redmond's appeal to the King on behalf of the Lord Mayor, said that Mr. Redmond was acting without the authority from the Irish Republic party. Mary MacSweeney, the Lord Mayor's sister today replied to a telegram which Premier Lloyd-George sent to her from Lucerne yesterday. "I made no appeal to your exceptional treatment of my brother. I warned you of your responsibility in the event of his death. He and his comrades demand their freedom as their right. If my brother or any of his comrades must die to win that freedom, they do so willingly, we are proud of them, but their death lies on you and your government. The self determination with which you say England went to war, is as much Ireland's right as Poland's. We claim it and will have it even if you have decided that my brother is to die."

SHARKS OFF HALIFAX HARBOR.

HALIFAX, N.S., August 27.—Pilot schooners on the cruising station at the mouth of Halifax harbor report that the waters there are infested with sharks. One of the vessels in today reports having harpooned 7 of the fish the largest ten feet long.

LOAN FUND FOR INTENDING TEACHERS.

ST. JOHN, N.B., August 27.—A suggestion was made at the provincial conference of school inspectors here today that the government may establish a loan fund for intending school teachers who have not sufficient money to pay their way through normal school.

HEAVY DAMAGES AWARDED SCHOONER OWNERS.

HALIFAX, N.S., August 27.—\$70,000 damages were awarded by Justice Mellich in the Admiralty Court in the case of the local schooner Francis Aetel versus the English steamer Downshire Head which sank the schooner in collision off Yarmouth last year. The owners of the schooner were awarded a similar amount and the balance to relatives of the seamen drowned and to survivors for loss of their effects.

HALIFAX NAVAL AIR STATION TO BE RETAINED.

HALIFAX, August 27.—The orders to close the naval air station here have been countermanded. Major A. B. Shearer of the Air Board said today. Three more flying boats are to be assembled here and a transcontinental flight is planned for next month.

BELFAST, Ireland August 27.—Anti Sinn Fein rioting which broke out here last night continued this morning. Hospitals were full of injured. Fifty-five buildings were burned by mobs. An attempt to destroy Catholic property led to retaliatory measures by Nationalists, streets were patrolled by armored cars and tanks and machine guns were freely used.

COMMUNISTS CAUSE \$2,000,000 FIRE

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Munitions and hydro airplanes, valued at nearly \$2,000,000, which were recently confiscated by the Entente Commission in the Hinteche works on Spree River, were destroyed on Thursday evening by 3,000 employees of plant, many of whom are Communists, says a Berlin despatch to the London Times. The Reichswehr was summoned out but proved powerless to act. The government is sending representatives to scene.

U. S. LONGSHOREMEN STRIKE IN REPRISAL

For Imprisonment of Mayor of Cork and Refusal to Allow Mannix to Go to Ireland.

NEW YORK, August 27.—Twelve hundred longshoremen employed on the piers of the White Star Line here went on strike this afternoon as a protest against imprisonment of Terence McSweeney in an English prison and the refusal of the English Government to permit Archbishop Mannix of Australia to visit Ireland they were joined by about 800 longshoremen from a Cunard Liner, an English concern and 130 firemen from the White Star Liner Baltic.
