CANADIAN BROTHERHOOD OF RAILWAY EMPLOYEES.

There are various well known associations and orders of railway men, each embodying those employed in one kind of work, as conductors, locomotive engineers, telegraph operators, and so on.

The Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees whose Grand Division has been for some days past in session in this city, embraces those engaged in various lines of railway work, principally the local and general office clerks, freight-handlers, round-house-men, baggage men and railway police men.

This Order, the first of its kind in America, was organized in Moncton, the principal railway centre of Eastern Canada, October 12, 1908.

The railway men there form a considerable host in number. Many of them had been members of an international organization which proved unsatisfactory in various ways and the result was a withdrawal of membership and the creation of the Canadian Brotherhood on the date just named.

The order was incorporated by Dominion statute in July 1909. The key note of the C. B. R. E. as it is spoken of by its initial letters, is bettered conditions, improved service, greater efficiency and a higher conception of intellectual and moral responsibility among the membership.

These are most worthy objects and those of the Brotherhood whom it has been our pleasure to meet have given the impression of high capability and the most honorable motives. They are very heartily welcomed to Charlottetown and our citizens will be glad to see the officers and delegates of the Grand Division of C. B. R. E. here at any time in the future.

THE MANUFACTURERS.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association took alarm at the demonstrations in favor of tariff reduction in the Northwest during the recent tour of Sir Wilfred Laurier and his associates, and have felt the necessity of meeting and counteracting it by every means in their power.

The delegates enroute to the annual meeting now being held in Vancouver addressed a number of meetings on the way in which the old arguments in favor of more or less high protection were again stated in most plausible terms.

No great measure of enthusiasm greeted the speakers, but their organization is a most persistent and resourceful one and not easily discouraged. The committee to whom the matter of what may be called the manufacture of public opinion was referred has recommended a large and liberal grant for "advertising."

It would seem they think public opinion in favor of protection can be made to order precisely as were fencing or farm machinery can be. In the meantime that strong protectionist journal, the Toronto World, has given them warning, which it is hoped may be acted upon, that they must manufacture goods cheaper and unless they can produce home-made articles equal in quality to imported goods, they must expect a demand for free trade.

The warning is a significant one, and takes it for granted that after

The order is extending its work and increasing its membership and looks to a large extension in the near future. It is understood that among the important questions which have occupied the Grand Division during its meeting here are, the advisability of affiliation with the Canadian Federation of Labor, the question of annual or biennial sessions, the reduction of representation from local divisions to the Grand Division, some amendments to the present constitution, the election of Grand Officers and the selection of the place for next meeting.

There are a number of reasons why the meeting should be of special interest to the railway men of Prince Edward Island. One is that the order is a purely Canadian one, and another reason is that the headquarters being at Moncton, and a large portion of its present membership being in the Government Railway service, there is a strong bond of mutual and patriotic interest among them all.

The officers and delegates of the C. B. R. E. appear to have enjoyed their visit to this city and express themselves as highly pleased with what they have seen of the Province and its capital. The railway men and citizens here have been pleased to meet them. We doubt not that the meeting will be found both profitable and useful in extending pleasant mutual acquaintance and in advancing the common interests of all concerned. When in the future another meeting shall be held here the delegates will be the more welcome from the highly favorable impression they have created during their present visit.

And that in the end will be found the only way.
