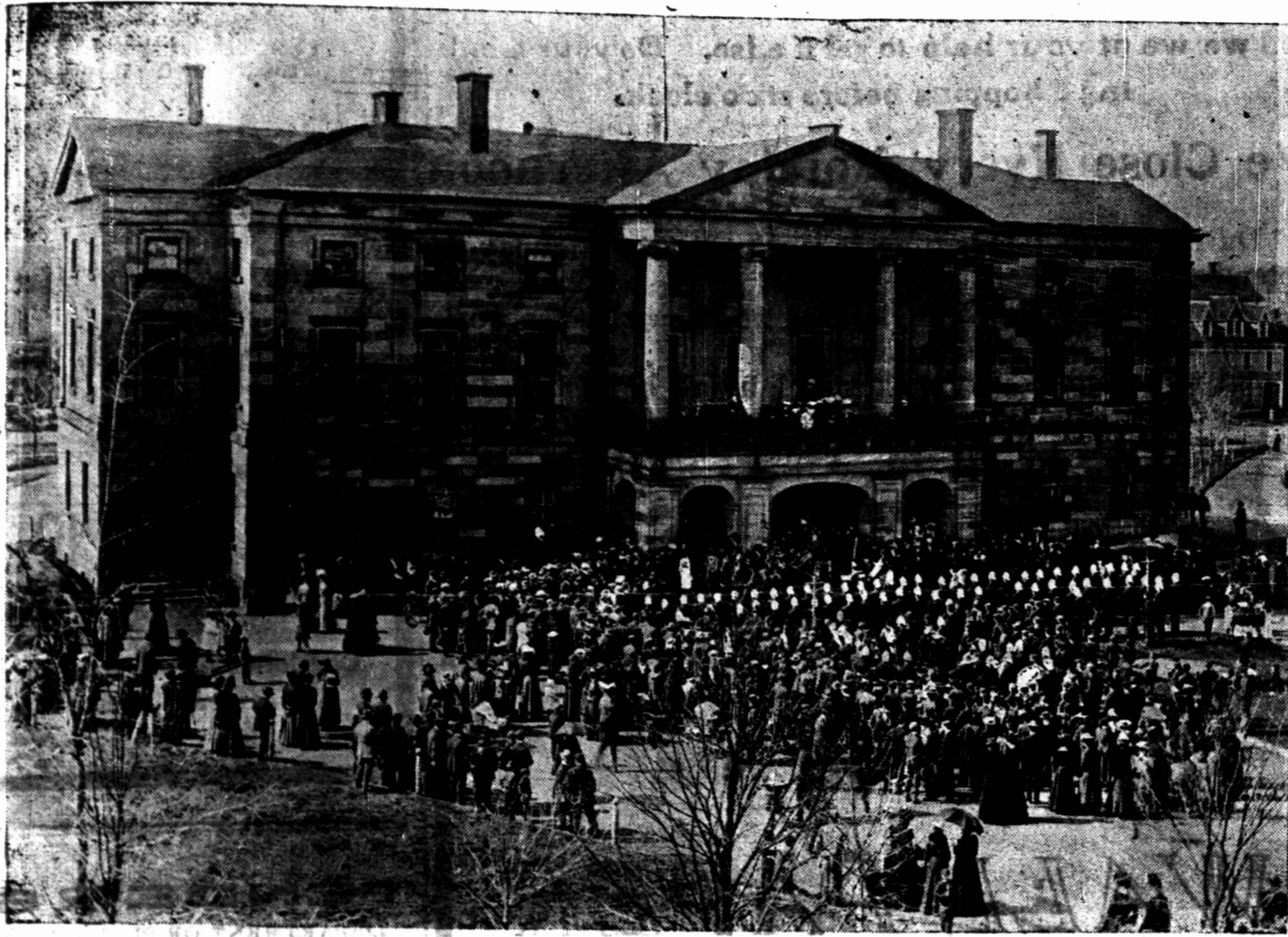

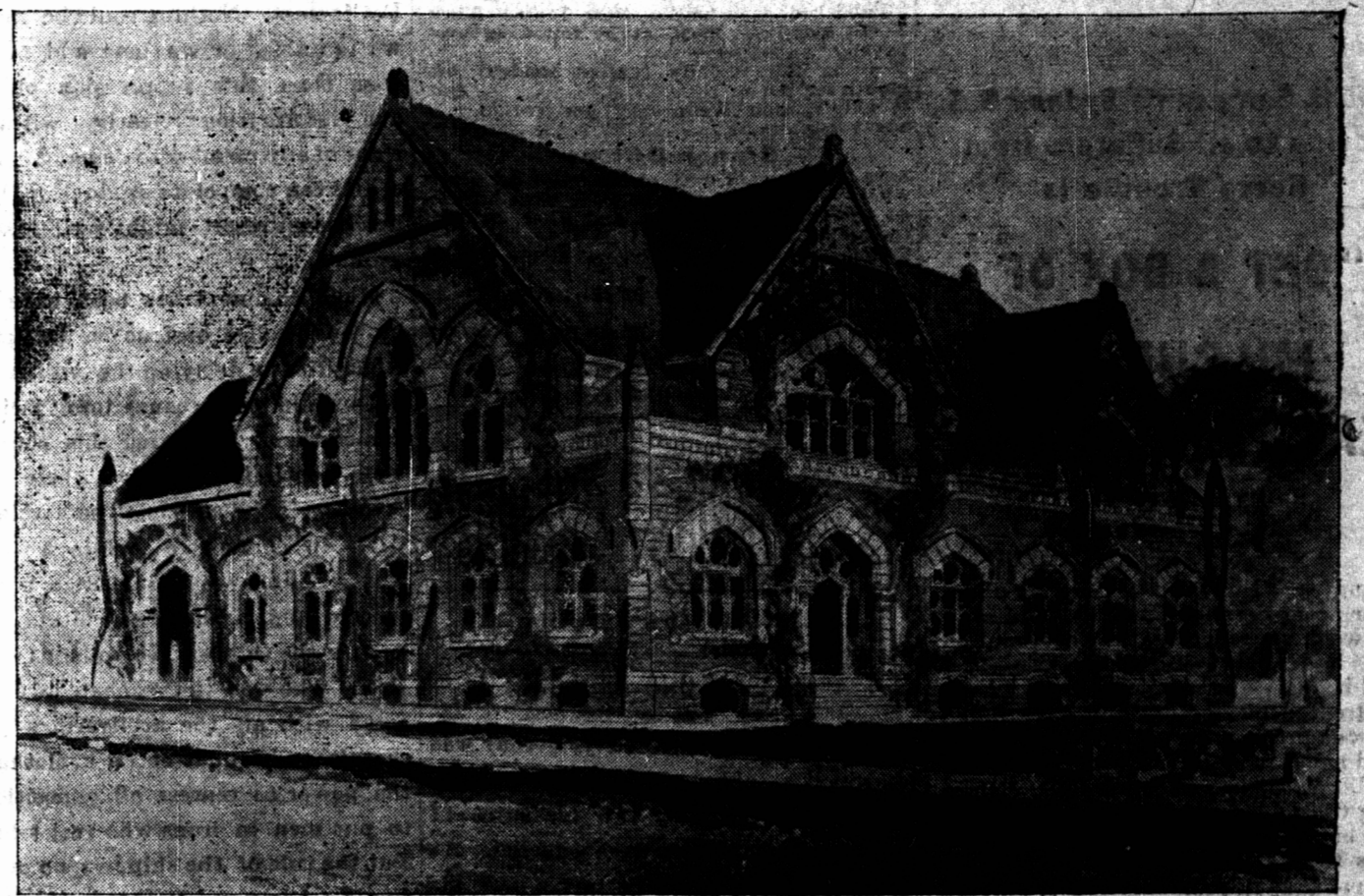

THE PROPOSED NEW MARKET HOUSE.

The above cut is an excellent reproduction of the new market house from the plan of W. C. Harris. The treatment is Gothic. The building is 180 ft X 116 ft with 65 ft side walls and total height of 72 ft. It is to be built two stories high of local sandstone with trimmings of Wallace graystone. The second floor comprises an assembly hall 128 ft X 72 ft and in addition men's and women's dressing rooms, lavatories and a large corridor. The ground floor is made up of a fish market, floored with expanded metal and concrete 78 ft X 30 ft. There is also a meat market, restaurants, private stalls, etc. There are five entrances.

THE CLOSING OF THE LEGISLATURE

Yesterday Afternoon With Appropriate Ceremony

The Governor's Speech and the Bills Assented to—Handsome Turn-outs by Large Bros Much Admired.

After a meeting of exactly five weeks, the third session of the 31th General Assembly of Prince Edward Island was prorogued yesterday afternoon by His Honor Lieutenant Governor McIntyre with all the ceremony characteristic of that annual event. The Guard of Honor in command of Capt. A. A. Bartlett presented a soldier-like appearance and with the martial music of the Fourth Regiment Band, the turn out was a most creditable one. At three o'clock the Governor accompanied by his Aide-de-Camp and the Sergeant at Arms drove to the Provincial Building. The handsome matched teams, one pair of black horses, and one pair of white with the easily running rubber tired carriages from the popular livery of Large Bros. were perhaps the most admired feature of the closing.

SPEECH.

Of His Honour Peter Adolphus McIntyre, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, on closing the Third Session of the Thirty-fourth General Assembly, on Thursday, the Thirtieth day of April, 1903. Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: As your legislative duties are now concluded, I have much pleasure in congratulating you upon the many useful measures you have enacted during the session. I thank you for the liberal supplies you have voted for the Public Service, and assure you that it shall be the aim of my Government to expend them with due economy. In now taking leave of you, I desire to express my earnest hope that your labours may, under Divine blessing, conduce to the material advantage of this Province. The bills assembled to during the session were: Following are the Acts assented to: To amend an Act for the encouragement of Agriculture. To alter the provisions of wills, of Wm. and Geo. Douglas. To consolidate and further amend the Acts Incorporating the Town of Summerside. Respecting property of married women. Respecting the Dominion Packing Company, Limited. To incorporate the Trustees of the Presbyterian Church at Clifton New London in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada and to vest certain lands therein. To amend an Act respecting investment of Trust Funds. Respecting the profession of Medicine.

A STUPENDOUS MOUNTAIN SLIDE

Fills up a Valley Three Quarters Mile Wide

And Two Miles Long—A Village Buried—C. P. R. Track Submerged 100 Feet—The Loss of Life.

A COLOSSAL LAND SLIDE. MONTREAL, April 30.—(Special)—The Canadian Pacific say the trouble at Frank was caused by a huge rock slide. There was no explosion but the slide was of such large dimensions that the immense cloud of dust raised was taken for smoke. **MOUNTAIN SLID INTO A VALLEY.** The whole east end of the mountain, extending from the mouth of the Frank mine slit into and blocked up the entire valley, three quarters of a mile wide and a mile and a half long. **THE FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE.** The loss of life is not yet estimated. Thirty miners are said to be in the mine. Ten houses in east end of the village are destroyed and some entire families perished. **FEW BODIES RECOVERED.** Further slides are feared. It is doubtful if many bodies can be recovered. Only seven have so far been recovered and most of these were beyond identification, so frightfully had they been crushed. **THE C. P. R. REVENUE BOOM IS CONTINUED

Returns for April and for Ten Months Compared

The Redistribution Committee Meet—Dock Strike in Montreal is Quiet—All Militia is Under Arms

THE BOOMING REVENUE. OTTAWA, April 30.—(Special)—The customs revenue for the month of April was nearly half a million greater than for the same time last year. The collections for the present month \$3,233,473, an increase of \$130,494, over April 1902. **TEN MONTHS COLLECTIONS.** The collections for ten months were \$29,988,702, an increase of \$3,600,115 over ten months last year. **THE REDISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.** The special committee appointed to draft the boundaries under the new redistribution bill met this morning and organized with Ayman as chairman. Nothing was decided upon as to what principles shall govern the committee. **THE GREAT DOCK STRIKE.** MONTREAL, April 30.—(Special)—The strike situation is quiet. President Gompers has arrived but he declares his visit has no connection with the strike but he is here to speak at Sohmer Park. He will be escorted by 30,000 members of the organized labor societies. CALAIS, France, April 23.—Three fishing smacks at St. Thomas and St. Guistave are reported to have foundered in the Channel. Fourteen men are believed to have been drowned.

TEMPORARILY DESPONDENT

Purchased A Bottle of Carbohic Acid

And Drank Contents—A Sad Occurrence Yesterday Afternoon Near the Apothecaries Hall Corner.

The sad death took place a few minutes before six last evening at the Apothecaries Hall corner of William Irwin, an old and well known resident of Charlottetown. The deceased who had recently been ill for some time of pneumonia and had not fully recovered, under a despondent impulse visited the Apothecaries Hall about ten minutes to six and purchased from the druggist, Charles Hughes an ounce bottle of carbohic acid which had been already prepared for sale. Going out on the street he withdrew the cork in front of G. F. Hutchison's store and drank the contents throwing the empty bottle away on the street. He walked a few steps further and then caught a post in front of W. A. Hutchison's confectionery store. A crowd quickly gathered and stimulants were at once administered but it was only possible to inject a small quantity of the antidote. Mr. Irwin was taken to his home on King Street in a partly conscious condition by Officer Taylor, and Dr. Warburton was summoned but a moment or two after the house was reached the unfortunate man expired. Coroner Dr. McNeill after ascertaining the facts of the death determined that an inquest was unnecessary. Mr. Irwin served for twenty-three years in the English army and in 1896 was on the Island with the Fourth—The King's Own Regulars. After receiving his discharge he returned to this province and was in receipt of a comfortable pension from the British Government. The sympathy of a large circle will be extended to the bereaved relatives in which The Guardian sincerely joins.

RAILWAYS' SLAUGHTER BILL.

OTTAWA, April 28.—According to returns presented to the house to-day, there were in 1901 742 cattle, sheep and horses killed on Canadian railways, at points of intersection with highways, and 1,185 were killed at other points on railway lines. Amid Wild Cheering to Depart for Paris
