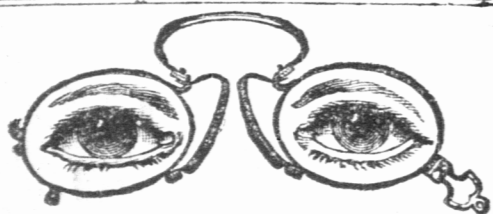

LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

The Evangelical Churchman says:—Rev. H. C. Ayfner, of Prince Edward Island, has an admirable tract on spiritualism call the "Revival of Necromancy," published by the Church of England Book Society, 11 Adam St., London, Eng. It ought to be widely circulated.

"WHAT I saw in England" was the subject of a lecture delivered in the Methodist Church Monday evening by Rev. Wm. Dobson, of Halifax. The reverend gentleman was not greeted by a very large audience—lecturers in Pictou seldom are,—but we can assure him that his hearers enjoyed every moment of their stay. Mr. Dobson is an observant man and a fluent speaker. Most entertainingly did he speak of his impression of the people of England and Scotland, and of historic spots in these countries, which he visited last year. Although the weather that evening was not favorable, it is not creditable to us as a community that so few assembled to hear Mr. Dobson, who justly deserves the reputation he has won as a public speaker. And yet we cannot but feel that his appearance in Pictou was not advertised as it should have been. We doubt very much if Mr. Dobson could be induced to again lecture in Pictou, but if our Methodist friends can prevail upon him to do so, we feel safe in saying that he will have a much larger house.—Pictou Advocate.

The St. John Sun under the head of "A Real Grievance" says: The Charlottetown people and the whole population of Prince Edward Island have a serious grievance in their wretched telegraph service. There is a line of cable and a connecting system of telegraph. But business closes early in the evening and opens late in the morning. The cost of the service is in inverse proportion to its efficiency. Private messages are charged twice as much as the people pay in other provinces. Press rates are practically prohibitive. Yet the geographical position of the province is such that a good and cheap telegraph system is more necessary than in most other places, where the mails are more frequent and regular. The editor of the Charlottetown Guardian has appealed to the outside press for sympathy and support in the struggle to obtain a better service. There will be no lack of support from the papers on the mainland, for though they suffer less than the Charlottetown papers from the want of constant wire communication with the Island and the high tolls, they do not wholly escape. A morning paper in St. John might like to know what happened at Charlottetown the night before. But even if it chooses to pay the absurd tolls, it could not get the message until the next day, and by that time it could get the facts by mail.
