Bonura Paces Chisox To Win Over Revamped Senators; Yankee's Blank Browns 10-

IN THIS CORNER

The suspension handed out Wednesday by officials of the Softball League marked the first time such a drastic move had been made in local ball circles and should serve as a warning to the rest of the players. Baiting of players is all right in its place and is part and parcel of the game but when an umpire makes a decision players must learn to abide by it.

An official's job is no soft affair at any time and players can make it that much easier if they would but desist from continually harassing them on almost every decision they make. This is not by any means a slam directed at the suspended player, a boy who is in the game every minute and fights to win on every occasion. Almost every player in the league is guilty of the offence at one time or another. It happens in the heat of hard fought games continually, but the quicker the players curb their quick-triggered actions the better it will be for the league and players themselves.

Champion Jim Evans was impressive in a ten-round workout at Kensington rink Wednesday night. The champion displaying superb condition, showed plainly that it will be a tough job for anyone to dethrone him. Three sparring partners, working every other round, were given bristling sessions by the Irishman and at the conclusion of the workout were badly winded while Evans had hardly a hair on his head turned.

Evans is a vastly improved fighter over the boy who worked his way through an elimination series and then dethroned Leslie in two rounds. Tipping the scales at 180 pounds, he is faster than ever; his punches carry more sting and snap than ever and he is proving an elusive target to connect solidly with.

He convinced the large crowd that witnessed his workout last night that his title-winning effort was no fluke victory. He is apparently ready for the bell at any moment now and is quietly confident of again showing his superiority over his earnest and determined challenger.

No matter what way his title fight with Joe Louis ends champion Jim Braddock, in one sense of the word, is bound to be a winner. He is to receive very nearly a quarter of a million dollars for less than an hour's work and this was no joke either. He is the all-time record of nearly three million dollars that the second Tunney-Dempsey affair drew at the gate.

Braddock receives 50 per cent of the gate for risking his title while the negro has to be content with a mere 17 1/2 per cent. Although this seems an uneven division it follows established precedent that the champion always receives the lion's share. At that, however, Louis won't fare off so badly. The fight West when it goes for a fight, the whole way and as witness of the fact is the all-time record of nearly three million dollars that the second Tunney-Dempsey affair drew at the gate.

After Braddock has settled with his manager and pays off his training debts it is a safe bet that the champion will fix himself solidly for the remainder of his days. The batter who came off the reeling rolls knowing the value of a dollar, something the New Jersey Irishman learned when he was considered just a washed-up fighter and jobs were scarce. There won't be any financial slip-ups now that he has the opportunity of setting any money worries that might spring up if and when he is deprived of his title.

Bill Terry can't seem to get in the good graces of the baseball writers. While the majority of the scribes respect him as a manager, his aloof, disdainful attitude causes more than one blast to be directed at him and such actions won't help the Giants' cause any. Terry's attitude is that the writers should be told certain things and the upset of it all is that he is rapidly becoming one of the most unpopular men in baseball. Terry's position must be strange to the Giants' boss who in his playing days was considered by the same writers whom he is now disdaining as one of the all-time greats among the first basemen, and who was then apparently one of the most popular.

The fans voted Zeké the city's outstanding performer for May and the automobile was the prize. His homer, two doubles and a single and Luke Appling's double and three singles set the pace for the season's biggest two club clouting spree as the Sox found Monte Weaver and two other Nat pitchers for 17 hits and Washington walloped Johnny Whitehead for 13. Four Washington hits were contributed by Buddy Lewis, one of them a homer in the ninth.

The victory, the White Sox 11th in their last 12 starts, boosted them back into second place in the American League.

The Ferrell brothers, Rick and Was, and outfielder Mel Amada, all received from Boston Red Sox in trade yesterday, made their debut in Washington uniforms. Wes fled out as a pinch hitter; Rick caught the last three innings, and Amada played the full nine innings.

The winning run came in the seventh inning when Pete Fox singled and scored on a long fly by Charley Gehring. Gerald Walker smashed a home run over the scoreboard in the second inning for two scores.

YANKEES BLANK BROWNS
New York Yankees blanked the Browns 10-0 at St. Louis as Joe DiMaggio banged out his 10th and 11th homers of the year and Charley Ruffing held St. Louis to five hits.

The victory, second in a row for the Yankees, maintained their one-game lead in the American League race.

Murderer's Row clicked on all cylinders, clubbing Jack Knott and rookie Butch Trotter for 17 hits. After two scoreless innings, the World Champions found the range, and thereafter coasted in, with Lou Gehring contributing his ninth homer of the year in the final inning as an anti-climax.

The win was Ruffing's fifth in six starts since he ended his hold-out.

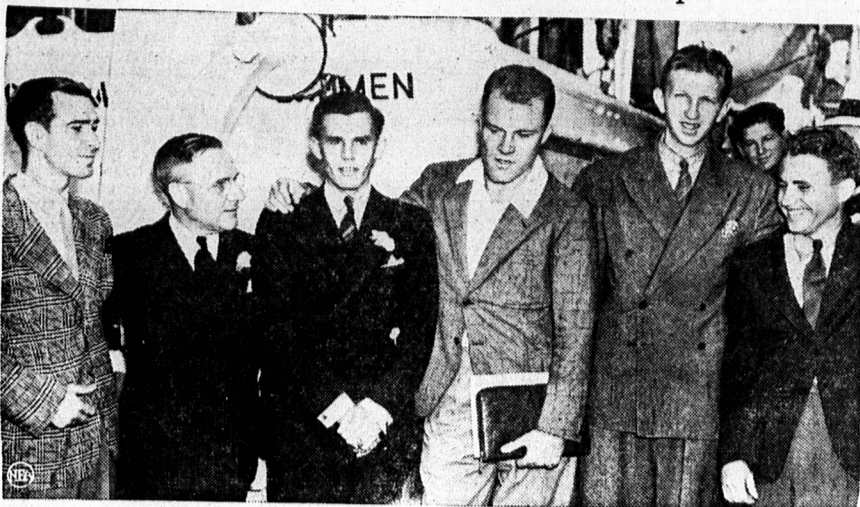
ATHLETICS WALLOP TRIBE

Giants Trade Fitzsimmons To Dodgers
NEW YORK, June 11—(AP)—Bill Terry, Manager of the pace setting Giants of the National League, traded a 35-year-old pitcher for a promising 22-year-old hurler today when he sent fat Freddy Fitzsimmons and cash to Brooklyn Dodgers for Tommy Baker.

Although neither pitcher has shown much this year, the deal figures to benefit both clubs. Fitzsimmons, a consistent right hander since starting his Major League career with Giants in 1925, should fill a big gap in the Dodgers' mound staff as a starting hurler. Baker, less than two years out of the minors, has failed to live up to expectations in the matter of games won and lost but Terry believes he has a corner in the young Texan.

Thomson Cracks Record To Enter Four-way Tie In U.S. Open Golf Tourney

BIRMINGHAM, Mich., June 11—Cracking the Oakland Hills competitive record with a 66, six under par, and equaling the all-time low mark for a single round in the United States Open Golf Championship, blond Jimmy Thomson, the siege gun from Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa., climaxed an epic day by entering a four-way tie for the lead at the halfway stage of the tournament.

Thomson's dazzling round, marked by six birdies and one eagle, gave him a 36-hole total of 140 and completed the pace-making deadlock with three professional rivals, Ralph Guldahl and Frank Walsh of Chicago and big Ed Dudley of Philadelphia.

Guldahl, who was on the verge of a record smashing round himself before Thomson provided the day's crowning shot-making thrills, added a three-putter par 69 in his previous 71. Walsh and Dudley, playing together, duplicated their first round 70s.

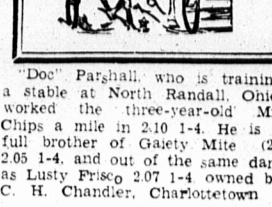
22-year Old Scots Girl Wins Golf Crown
TURNBERRY, Scotland, June 11—(AP)—Jessie Anderson, 22-year old daughter of a Scottish professional, succeeded Pamela Barton as British Women's Golf Champion today.

A stubborn fighter with a magi putting touch, Miss Anderson played steady golf all the way through Doris Parks, another Scottish star, 6 and 4, in the 35-hole final round.

They battled doggedly through the morning round and went to lunch all square. Miss Parks started off the afternoon round by winning the 19th but Miss Anderson secured the match at the 20th and then won the 22nd, 23rd and 24th in succession to take a lead she never relinquished.

Miss Anderson's steadiness personified as she played each nine of the first 27 holes of the match in 49 strokes. Miss Parks, who was leading the hot sun in the afternoon, brought about her defeat when she lost a neutral of her words.

"Doc" Parshall, who is training a stable at North Randall, Ohio, worked the three-year-old Mr. Chips a mile in 2:10 1/4. He is a full brother of Gaiety Mite (2) 2:05 1/4, and out of the same dam as Lusty Frisco 2:07 1/4 owned by C. H. Chandler, Charlotetown.

Mr. Chandler had a letter from Walnut Hill Farm, Lexington Kentucky, a few days ago, which gave all the facts re the produce of Gaiety Mite 2:16 3/4, and they are most interesting. Seven of her sons and daughters by such sires as Peter Volo 2:02, San Francisco 2:07 1/4 and Chestnut Peter 2:03 1/4, have taken fast records. I have several times referred to the fact that Gaiety Mite is a full sister to the world's champion trotter Lee Axworthy 1:58 1/4 and Bud Axworthy 2:14, owned by J. T. Waite, Summerside.

Lusty Frisco has been given practically no chance as a sire, and his only representative in this Province is the year-old owned by Alfie Webster, Marie However with his magnificent breeding—being by San Francisco 2:07 1/4 and out of such a noted brood mare as Gaiety Mite 2:16 3/4—he will, when racing days are over, be no doubt accorded an opportunity to win further glory through the performances of sons and daughters.

Harry O'Brien, Alberton, paid a visit to the Charlotetown race track Tuesday and conversed with several horsemen there re classes for the Dominion Day meet which he is putting on at Summerside. They seemed delighted with the opportunity of making a start in the Western capital on our Dominion's birthday. The problem that confronts Harry is to get enough horses for his last class.

The owner of Lusty Frisco 2:07 1/4 was O. K. and so is a Plucky Scott 2:06 which are the only first class eligibles in this vicinity with the exception of Heatherbell 2:08 1/4, that has uncovered too much speed so does not fit in. Not much difficulty will be experienced in filling up the slow classes as there must be 15 or 20 horses in training that can fit in from 2:21 to 2:27, and then there are as many more eligible to the 2:27 to 2:30 classes.

The fastest work-outs at the Charlotetown track since last Back Stretch were Plucky Scott 2:06 in 2:20, Rosebud 2:19 1/4 in 2:22 1/2, Jackie Volo in 2:23. Harvey Veldy in 2:22 Heatherbell 2:18 Heatherbell has been a half in 1:04 1/2 and a quarter in 30 3/4 seconds. The four-year-old trotter Millie Kalmuck has not been asked for any speed, miles in 2:35 being her best effort. The three-year-olds Leland and Guy Kalmuck have worked in about the same notch.

At Upton Farm track Fred Cameron has five under his wing, but he has been working slow, the best mile by any candidate in his stable was Lusty Frisco's 2:29 1/2 effort. The two-year-old full brother to Guy Kalmuck, owned by "Hole-in-One" Jack Kennedy, is coming along fast and Fred is very high on him. Bob O'Boy 2:14 owned by Hugh Walker, North River, is working nicely and will likely take a trip to Summerside for Dominion Day races.

At Marie trainer Harry "Pomp" Bailey has been a mile in 2:30 with Lyle Kalmuck 2:14 and is making good progress with the two-year-old and three-year-old Futurity candidates owned by Alfie Webster. Harry likes his new job fine. Balbo 2:15 has been added to the stable Helen Worthly being given in trade for the namesake of the great Italian aviator, Archie Campbell. Lower Montague is the new owner of Helen Worthly.

A friend of mine paid a visit to Myron McArthur's training quarters a few days ago and came back all "bet" up with the appearance and condition of Myron's pupils. George Callbeck's three, Bud Cope 2:14 1/4, Guy Ann 2:16 3/4 and the three-year-old sister are looking like picture horses and training to perfection. Bud Cope has improved in gait and appearance and 2:10 is predicted for him at Charlotetown. But perhaps the most improved of the whole outfit is friend, He is well up in flesh, his skin is clear and satiny and he is a real grand looking trotter with more speed and a better way of going than last year. There is also a two-year-old trotter by Bellini Scott that looks like Futurity material. Myron has an assistant that experienced caretaker Jim McInnis.

At Summerside Mac Steele is training four including the grand old warrior Frank J. Ortolan 2:13. Clarence Schuman has four or five in his stable with Helen D. 2:14 looking well and full of speed. At the extreme western part of the Island is Harry O'Brien with a stable full including the three-year-old Nite, Volo and Bud Volo, both winners as two-year-olds. Tricie Volo 2:11 1/4 and Soviet 2:12 1/4 that Harry believes will beat 2:10 this year.

Soviet is owned by Andrew Perry, Summerside, and is sired by Lee Tide 2:03 1/4, sire of

Spencer (3) 1:59 1/2. His dam is Janova 2:19 by Peter the Great. She is the dam of several trotters and three pacers, so Soviet, like Lusty Frisco, has a tremendous lusty inheritance on both sides of his pedigree.

Ben White, oldest trainer in the business and greatest success with Futurity winners, plans to take 35 head to the race, whether he will campaign these all in one stable or split them up and race them over the twice-around and mile rings has not been definitely decided, but that would seem to be the likely thing to do.

There are 65 trotters and pacers training at Lewiston, Maine, fair grounds, and in these miles in 2:15 were common Maine, like the "Battle-ground of the Republic" as the races start there in two weeks time at Old Orchard mile track and will continue for nineteen weeks at various tracks throughout the State. Nothing like it has ever been known in any of the palmy days of the New York State Futurity contests are coming from every direction so there will be many "also-rans."

Sweden is buying up a large number of fast record brood mares that have proved good producers, also a number of second-classions of improved blood lines. The latest exportation to that country was The Day Star stallion Field Day 2:05, and four brood mares. One of them, Trance, is a speed producer sister to Spencer 1:59 3/4.

Henry Clukey, that bit of driving dynamite that came under the eyes of quite a number of our local fans at Fredericton, N. B. Exhibition last fall, is at Lewiston, Maine, track with Laurel Hanover 1:59 1/4, Mildred May 2:04 3/4, Lochwiner 2:04 1/4, Federal 2:07 1/4, Miss Uhlens Volo 2:09 1/4 and five others.

Millionaire sportswomen such as Mrs. Roland E. Harriman, were prominent in the amateur harness races at Good Time Park, Goshen, N. Y., Monday afternoon, May 31st. Walter Cox, the noted driver, who was presiding judge, commented favorably on their racing manship and racing tactics. They all drove to court and seemed to enjoy the sport quite as much as their husbands, who were also participants in other classes.

John E. Kelly of Bangor, Maine, had a winner the other day at Brockton, Ohio, in the three-year-old pacer Grateful Girl, which took a record of 2:11. The three-year-old trotter Peckles was one of the new entrants in the 2:10 class by winning a heat in 2:09 1/2 at Langhorne, Pa., May 31st. The fastest mile of the three day meeting was by the four-year-old pacer Volodade that trained in 2:07 3/4 and was sold immediately after the race for a long price.

Next Saturday night Hedley T. Fulton of Upper Stewiacke, N. S., will be sitting up until the wee sma' hours waiting for a telegram from Canfield, Ohio, with the results of the big Free-for-All which will be staged there that evening. Canfield races start Monday and will continue through to June 26th, but the big time show of the whole race meet will be next Saturday night when the best of the Free-for-All brigade will perform under the lights.

Starters will include Little Pat (3) 1:59 1/2, champion three-year-old, Jaue Azoff 1:59 1/2, champion pacing mare of 1936 and holder of the present Canfield track record of 2:01 1/4, Colonel Drew 2:3, champion race winning pacer of 1936, Cardinal Prince 1:58 3/4, champion record pacer, of 1936, Ray Henley 2:01 3/4, practically unbeaten over half-mile tracks the last few years, Tryax 2:02 1/2, who was a bearer over mile rings and twice-around last season, and several others who can turn on the gas when the occasion demands. The best of the big pile drivers such as Sep Palm, Doc Parshall, Vic Fleming, Charlie Mabrey, Charlie Lacey, Harry Short, will be there to "skull" them. Dec Parshall will hold the ribbons over Jane Azoff, Hedley Fulton's entry.

Classes for Summerside Dominion Day have been definitely decided upon and are as follows: 2:18 Trot and Pace (trotters allowed three seconds), 2:21 Trot and Pace 2:29 Trot and Pace. There are three good classes, and will probably give about as good racing as any that could be arranged for this season of the year. From now on eligible candidates will be given stiffer workouts and all should hit the track in good racing condition July 1st.

An arrangement is being worked out between the Prince Edward Island Harness Horse Futurity Association and the Provincial Exhibition Association, to hold the two, three and four-year-old Futurities in connection with this year's Exhibition races at Charlotetown, August 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th. It is felt that greater interest will be attracted to the Futurities by having them raced then and that eventually they will be as popular with the public as the Canadian Futurity races which are run in connection with the Toronto Exhibition.
