



bands who are not faithful and not divorce them. Listen to my story: I am now a widow, having had a husband who strayed from me and two small children. After ruling the life of a good woman, whose only fault was loving him too well, he confessed to me that this woman had borne him a son and he wanted me to divorce him so that he could marry her and legitimize the child. I refused, but I have bitterly regretted it, for since my own children are grown they reproach me for trying to hold a man who no longer loved me and refusing to give the child a name. Now I would give my life to undo the wrong I did an innocent child by holding on to my husband.

A HEARTBROKEN WOMAN
ANSWER: You mistake my position on the divorce subject. I only advise wives to refuse to divorce their husbands when the man is of the philanderer type, one of the men who has no deep affection for any woman and who is lured away by every pretty face that crosses his path.

Also, I think a woman is wise not to rush off to the divorce court when she has a middle-aged husband who thinks he has fallen in love with some flapper young enough to be his daughter. But when a man tells his wife that he has ceased to love her and that he is in love with some other woman and that his whole happiness is bound up in this other woman, then I think the wife is wise to let him go in peace.

But I think you and your children's attitude toward your husband's misery and her child is the very acme of modern gallantry. It takes a fine spirit for a woman to see that the woman who has ousted her in her husband's affections can be a good woman who is the hapless victim of love and circumstances.
