SOUTH AFRICAN PROBLEMS.

Now that the prolonged war in South Africa apparently draws to a close the Parliament and people of the United Kingdom are acutely concerned with the problems which are presented in connection with the pacification and future government of the country. If these questions the British colonies and the late Dutch republics are alike concerned, for the matter of dealing with the rebel Dutch in Cape Colony and Natal is almost as difficult as reorganising the Dutch republics in the British Colonies. A recently issued blue book gives pretty clearly the views of the British Government and the late Government of Cape Colony on the first of these questions—the manner in which the colonial rebels ought to be dealt with.

It was a difference between the views of the Schreiner Government and the Home Government on this matter that caused the resignation of Premier Schreiner some weeks ago. His view was that there ought to be a full amnesty for the great mass of the Cape rebels, only the ringleaders and those who had committed outrages to be held to trial for high treason before a special Judicial Commission. The policy of clemency, it was held, would be pleasing to the large majority of the Dutch in the Colony who had remained loyal, and would also greatly facilitate the pacification of the Boer Republics. Mr. Chamberlain on the other hand found it impossible to accept these suggestions of great clemency. Justice to loyalists, he maintained was quite as important as clemency to rebels.

Mr. Chamberlain is opposed to allowing them to make rebellion profitable, and is equally determined that the loyal colonists shall not feel that disloyalty pays better than loyalty. He classifies the rebels as (1) ringleaders and promoters, (2) those who have committed outrages and looted property, (3) those who have treacherously used the white flag, fired upon hospitals, or otherwise violated the usages of civilized warfare. These three classes he would hand over for trial by the Judicial Commission for high treason. Then he comes (4) to those who have openly and willingly waged war, and (5) those who have aided the enemy by giving information or supplying food. These two classes, he thinks, might be allowed to plead guilty, and to escape with a fine and disfranchisement. Finally, there would be those who had become rebels under compulsion, and these he would simply disfranchise. No punishment should be less than a deprivation of political rights for at least five years. For the graver offences the disfranchisement would be for life, with such other penalties as the court might prescribe.

The Government program for the future government of the late Republics appears to be a military administration till the people are reduced to submission and pacified, then to be merged in the crown colony form, and at some future date full representative institutions to be restored. There is a minority of the British Parliament, who opposed the war from the outset and are still opposed to the annexation of the Boer country. But the policy of annexation has been endorsed in the Commons by a very large majority, and we doubt not will be sustained by the country in the elections now near at hand. It is tolerably certain that in Canada and Australia the general feeling is that the Cape rebels ought to be condignly punished at the outset, and made to feel that rebellion cannot be indulged with impunity. The pardoning power of the Crown can be exercised later as good conduct may merit. But we should feel that the sacrifices we in Canada have made for the Empire were largely thrown away if Boer Republics were permitted to retain a hostile independence.

The Kaiser has lately appeared in the new role of preacher. A few days ago he preached on board his yacht, taking for his text the words, "Choose out men and go out to fight with Amalek." His discourse was an impassioned appeal for vigorous war against China and that the German people should pray for the success of the allied arms in the conflict.

When the young Duke of Westminster ran up the flag over Pretoria, he received the cigar which had been sent by a gentleman in England several months before within an envelope addressed "to the officer who hoists the Union Jack when that happy event takes place, Pretoria, South Africa." With the cigar was this laconic note: "Thanks. Have a cigar!" The sender began to fear that his "smoke" had missed fire, but the other day he received a letter of thanks, and acknowledgment from the young Duke dated Government House, saying Lord Roberts had at once given the cigar to him and he found it excellent.

According to the Examiner it condemns the Government because its members throughout twenty long years denounced protection. That was long ago and while they were in opposition. "They continue to maintain protection," says the Examiner, and it thinks protection a good thing. Now why does not our contemporary give them credit for doing a good thing while in power? We do not think so highly of the protective system as the Examiner does, but that is nothing here or there. Why condemn a party so severely for talking wrong and refuse all credit for doing right? We pause for a reply.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing, at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company, two Electric light plants, and a street railway in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shaded streets its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' here. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On its west side Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains, and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has about 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedouque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ Strathcona and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aiken, and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner; in Tignish, the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald; and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Sea side; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaford; and at Pownal, Florida.

In addition to these hotels already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description bounds.
