DOMINION RIFLE ASSOCIATION

The Dominion Rifle Association was inaugurated in January 1917. Today the membership is \$286 consisting of boys from 12 to 19 years of age and the number of clubs is 196, extending from coast to coast. Intense interest has been taken in this organization since its inception by schools cadet corps, boy scouts and similar organizations, which have formed units to enter into small bore rifle shooting under the regulations as laid down by Dominion Rifle Association Headquarters. Under the Dominion Rifle Association plan there are a series of competitions, each to be conducted under the supervision of an instructor, and awards consisting of, first a bronze pin, then a silver pin and later a gold pin—the last being for a rather severe test in rifle shooting—are made to competitors.

While there have been provincial and inter-provincial championship matches and special awards of gold watches, it has been unfortunate in the past that when members attained the age of 19 they were dropped from membership, and unless they acted upon their own initiative there was no incentive for them to continue their work in rifle competitions. Recognition of the "Dominion Rifle Association" by the Dominion Rifle Association removes this condition, and Dominion Rifle Association will now become members of the senior organization as soon as they have reached the age of 19 provided they hold gold pins issued by the Dominion Rifle Association. This entitles each boy who is issued free membership in the Dominion Rifle Association for one year to take part in all competitions

Rifle Association will include small bore competitions at all meets. The Chief of the General Staff of the Canadian Militia has issued instructions to his Officer in charge of Cadet Corps directing him to re-quest General Officers commanding all military districts to draw the attention of instructors of all Cadet Corps in their districts to the 1900 Union Marksmen scheme. It is expected a Dominion Rifle Association Headquarters that the increase in the number of clubs among Cadet Corps this year will be large as a result of this order.

FORFEITED DECORATIONS.—The Dominion headquarters, G. W. V. A., have been officially notified by the Army Council, England, that it has been decided to restore all D. C. M., M. M., and M. S. M. decorations forfeited by soldiers in the English army since August 4, 1914, provided they were not forfeited by sentence of death or for offence leading to discharge, where no reinstatement has been made. Deserters taken back and punished by the army will be entitled to their decorations. All gratuities, pensions, etc. dependent on these decorations, will also be restored. Mr. C. G. MacNeill, secretary of the Dominion command, G. W. V. A., has already applied to the Minis-

ter of Militia asking that the same ruling be made in Canada for Canadian soldiers affected.
