DISGUISED AS A VIOLIN PLAYER

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The defence in the trial of Norman Haggood, editor of Collier's Weekly, charged with criminal libel in publishing a paragraph relating to the connection of City Magistrate Joseph M. Deuel with Town Topics, continued today, the introduction of testimony as to the methods employed by Town Topics in securing its news matter and gossip, along with the experience of several men of prominence in dealing with publications concerning them in that paper.

Charles S. Wayne, formerly managing editor of Town Topics, was again a witness and testified at length. He said that Recorder Goff and Justice Vanbrunt of the appellate division of the supreme court had been criticised in Town Topics while Justice Deuel was connected with the publication.

Robert R. Rowe, who gave his occupation as Newport correspondent of Town Topics, later was called to the stand. He said he had been a telegraph operator at Newport and admitted that he had given the information secured by means of his connection with the telegraph company to Town Topics.

The girls were sliding on the hill and went into the brook, which ordinarily has little water, but owing to the unusual weather, it was flooded and running swiftly when the children were drowned.

NEW GLASGOW, January 25.—A woman named Mrs. Chisholm died at Hopewell several days ago as the result of burns sustained the day previous. It appears that the woman was alone in the house at the time, and sitting in front of the fire-place her dress caught fire. She was quickly enveloped in flames and her screams attracted the attention of people near by, who rushed to her rescue.
