**THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.**

It is interesting to read that there is something doing at Ottawa in regard to the telegraph service. A despatch to The Patriot tells that Messrs Haszard and McKinnon were to have a conference with the Anglo-American Telegraph Company yesterday, and that Minister Prefontaine has promised to equip the Minto and Stanley with the Marconi service and also to establish wireless stations in Charlottetown, Pictou and Newfoundland. We give in another column a brief message from Mr. Haszard M. P. on this subject in which he has taken so deep an interest, and our own correspondent's version of what Minister Prefontaine said in Parliament. It would seem from this that nothing is yet arranged with the Anglo-American Company, whose settled practice seems to be the least possible service for the largest amount of money the traffic will bear. We trust there may be no needless delay in these matters. At this end of the line people are still paying the old double rates and the wires are closed for twelve hours out of the twenty four.

Ottawa Citizen speaking as if with authority, says Lord Dundonald has not the slightest idea of entering Canadian political life, and intimates that a "high command" awaits him under the new army council scheme now about to go into effect in the Mother Country. It may be mentioned that The Guardian from the first discredited the report that Lord Dundonald would accept a party nomination in Canada.

A feature of the war is the little effective use which Russia has so far made of the cavalry arm during the struggle. As an exchange puts it the Japanese take no more notice of the vaunted Cossacks than if they were not on the landscape.

Various advices from St. Petersburg and Chefoo within the past few weeks have reported successive Japanese losses of thirty thousand, twenty thousand, seventeen thousand, and ten thousand men in as many battles around Port Arthur. To say nothing of minor battles in which from one to five thousand have been reported killed, the first foregoing figures make a total of 77,000. This is more than the total of the besieging force. As there are some left we conclude that the excellent correspondents must have been mistaken.

The Toronto Globe rises ponderously to remark as one of the distinguishing merits of the National Transcontinental Railway "that the line when completed will traverse every Province in the Dominion except Prince Edward Island." We had an impression that the line does not traverse Nova Scotia, but the Globe apparently thinks otherwise. Somebody should give the reverend editor of the Globe a few brief lessons in Canadian geography. It is not surprising that the English newspapers make mistakes of this sort when a leading Ontario newspaper gets so far astray. Moncton is not in Nova Scotia.

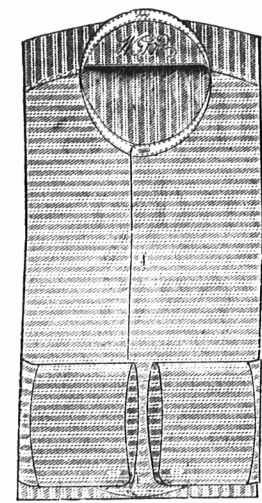
