AN OLD ISLAND There is an English parish, only forty-eight miles from London, where roads, shops, lamps, telephones, motor-cars, and post-offices are unknown. It is Elmley, and it is an island. Says the Boston Transcript: The island has an area of two thousand acres, and is the property of Oxford University.

Some time ago the island was the home of thirty-five men, women and children. The inhabitants are mostly "lookers" or shepherds of large flocks of sheep. The oldest man of the village is in his seventieth year. He has never seen a motor-car.

The school and the church are the two chief landmarks on the island. The reason they were built in such a sparsely populated spot is that in winter it is almost impossible to leave the island. The mud is literally knee-deep and the ferry that runs to and from the island is dangerous. A novel method of obtaining the services of the ferryman, who live opposite the island, is by opening the white door of a hut facing the shore. The ferryman on the lookout know that the open door is a signal for the ferry. At night a lighted candle held aloft serves the purpose of the open door.

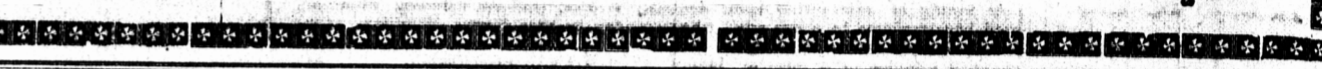
