A large number of friends of Major George Longworth Doherty, Kent Street, City will receive the news of his death with genuine regret. The deceased gentleman passed away yesterday morning about 1.30 in his eighty-second year. It is perhaps a military circles that the late Major Doherty was best known, and here among his superiors and subordinates he made for himself a most enviable name obtaining and holding a close friendship with all with whom he came in contact. He became attached to the militia while still in his teens and rose from a volunteer to the rank of Major. He became a major in the old Island Militia and later was appointed a Captain in the Charlotte town Engineers holding the Honorar rank of Major. He also served und Majors Pollard and Morris being 1st Lieutenant in the Artillery. 1878 he was a member of the Canadian team to Wimbledon, England, and was the first from this Province to win a place on this team. He was placed in command of the special battalion from this province which attended the review at Sussex in 1880 when the troops assembled were inspected by the Marquis of Lorne. He retired in 1884 and since then has been District Paymaster. The late Major Doherty was one of the foremost of the officers of the militia in this province and his highly principled and thorough military spirit was at all times admired by his fellow-men. He was a cabinet maker by trade and a splendid workman. It can in all verity be said of the late Major Doherty that he had no enemies but instead was beloved by everyone in all stations of life, professionally and socially. A sorrowing widow, two sons and one daughter survive him to cherish the memory of one who was in domestic life a kind husband and an affectionate father. The sons are Percy Doherty, at Ingleswood, Illinois, and Arthur Doherty, of Seattle. Mrs T. P. Calkin, of Kentville, N. S., is his daughter. Of these Mrs Calkin and Percy Doherty will arrive here to attend their father's funeral, of which notice will be found in another column. Col Frank Doherty, St Peter's Road, is a brother of the late Major Doherty. To the family and their many friends the Guardian extends most sincere sympathy.
