DR. DOUGLAS ELECTED.

There was very general interest in the election in the Second District of Queens yesterday which resulted in the return of Dr. Douglas by a large majority. Down to a few days ago there was strong, and apparently equal confidence in both camps. Just on the eve of the election, however, there was a stiffening of Liberal hopes and a proportionate decline in confidence on the Conservative side.

Several causes contributed to the result as shown in the returns. The District has a Liberal record and is one in which Premier Farquharson has a strong personal hold. The Government, which had lost a number of by-elections during the past few years, had undoubtedly improved its position before the country by repealing the License Law and adopting prohibition. Their candidate was well-chosen, as other things being equal, a doctor in practice is usually a strong candidate. He is in constant intercourse with the people among whom he practices his profession, visiting men of both parties at their homes and has rare chances of occasionally winning over a moderate political opponent.

On the other side the choice of Mr. Wise as a Conservative candidate was probably not a judicious one. Some one who had been a lifelong Conservative would probably have polled the full party strength in the District, which so new a recruit as Mr. Wise could hardly be expected to do. The election of a supporter by a largely increased majority will naturally be pleasing to the Government and the Ministerial party, and as it occurs in the Premier's own district, will be held to show that he has not lost the confidence of his old constituents.

The Rossland, B. C. Miner of recent date mentions that Mr. R. E. Palmer, formerly of Charlottetown, has been appointed by the directorate of the Rio Tinto Mining company of Spain as mining engineer of the underground department of the Rio Tinto mine. The mine referred to is one of the oldest and most famous copper mines known, and has been in successful operation for over 2,000 years. Mr. Palmer will receive a liberal salary, and it is no small tribute to his ability and skill that he has been selected for so important a position at such a distance. He will leave Rossland for Spain very shortly, passing through Charlottetown on his way to visit his relatives and many friends here.

An important decision in regard to the duties of administrators was rendered the other day by Judge McDougall of Ontario. A Mrs. Ball died intestate, leaving an infant of four years as sole heir. The Trustee and Guarantee Company was appointed administrator of the estate, which consisted of an hotel property, and afterwards disposed of it at private sale for \$4,100. When it came to passing the administrator's accounts the attorneys for the infant claimed that due effort had not been made by advertising to secure the full value of the property, and put a prominent citizen on the stand who testified he would have given \$5,000 for it. The Judge held the Trust Company liable for \$5,000, that is \$900 more than they had received for the property, together with the costs of suit, and interest on the \$900 since the sale.

## CLIMATE OF THE PHILIPPINES.

Due Care Will Prevent Disastrous Results—Eight Months of Fine Weather.

Tropical climate is enervating. Taking this truism into consideration, Dr. D. H. Morgan of the United States navy, recommends two years enlistments for the Philippines, instead of three. His recommendation is a good one on general principles, not for the reason as he insists that the second year is more depressing than the first, but because men thousands of miles from home, under duress of marches and constant patrol duty, become sick for home and the familiar scenes of childhood. Men who can care for themselves in the Philippines as they can care for themselves at home need have no more fear of the ravages of epidemics, plagues and the minor climate diseases than though they were under their own vine and fig tree.

There are many men in Manila who claim Germany, England, and America as countries of nativity who have resided here from eight to twenty-five years, and without an exception those with whom we have talked on this subject declare that men become acclimated as the months come and go; that the second year is safer and more enjoyable than the first, and that as times multiplies enervation gradually fades. This has been our experience. We have felt nothing of that climatic depression so much talked about in the States, but the major portion of our lot in the islands has been cast with the evil, and not with the military, so our experience may be taken with a little allowance, as it is paralleled with Dr. Morgan's idea.

Business-men may visit Manila with assurance that the climate will not kill them off before their time if they see the opening that means a competence. The climate is delightful eight months out of the year. Atmospheric humidity is somewhat distressing during the months of March, April, and May, but not so much so as it is in June, July, and August in the larger cities of the States. Population considered, Luzon can vie with the world for healthfulness.—Manila Freedom.
