Yesterday the display was viewed with much interest by many parents and school teachers as well as children.

Friday evening the delegates were welcomed to Trinity for their Congress by Mr. Ashford followed by introduction of leaders by Charles Downe. Highlights of the evening were: Part One of the theme course followed by study courses in different phases of Young People's work. Rev. Burton Corkum then led the Young People in a period of recreation. The evening session was brought to a close by an inspiring worship service led by Betty Barwise, Marie Munn, and Bob Younker. During this service a solo, "O Holy Night", was sung by Carmon Thompson. Saturday morning the group gathered at Heartz Memorial Hall for morning worship. The theme, "The Highway of Life" was led by Geraldine MacLean and Keith Moose of Kensington. This was followed by part two of the theme course. Ralph Raynor led the group in an open discussion on problems faced by the local unions after which the group had further discussion in the Departmental Courses. After lunch hour courses were again studied. On Saturday evening the delegates assembled in the social hall for a banquet. Guest speaker for the occasion was Mr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of P. W. C., who spoke on Democracy and Religion. A rousing sing-song was led by Rev. B. Corkum. During the sing-song a spiritual "Standing in the Need of Prayer", was most beautifully rendered by Rev. Lewis Murray, Rev. B. Corkum and Ron Dempsey of Moncton, N. B. Mr. Corkum then led the group in a short period of lively recreation. An evening service of worship was conducted by Henry Clark.

Beatrice Mair and Miriam Raynor, Soloists for the evening was Ron Dempsey, who sang "Father in High Heaven Dwelling." A beautiful violin solo was played by Ralph Raynor. At 9:30 Sunday morning the delegates gathered in the Church auditorium for an inspiring Communion Service conducted by Rev. Mr. Ashford and Rev. Mr. Corkum, after which the group attended Trinity United Church morning worship. The Congress was brought to a close on Sunday afternoon with a very interesting talk by Dr. Walter Shaw and a short sing-song led by Ron Dempsey. Mr. Frank MacKinnon discussed the challenge which democracy and religion present to citizens during the crisis of modern history. Democracy, he said, implied a distinction between the state and the individual, between loyalties to the state and loyalties to other bodies such as the church, service clubs, and economic and professional bodies. Democracy also involved government which is responsible to the people, and also an alert, active and interested public opinion. Democracy, he pointed out, is not built like a house, but rather it grows and develops like a tree and is nurtured by the active participation of individuals and groups who know its challenge and who are willing to do all they can to make it work. He went on to relate the challenge of modern Christianity with that of democracy and indicated how groups and individuals within the church can participate effectively in its work only by studying and expressing their opinion and beliefs and being able to defend them against other opinions and beliefs. Religion and Democracy are alike in that the forms are useless without the spirit which makes them worthwhile. The differences among Christians and Democrats are troublesome at times, but they are not as remarkable or significant as the basic unity among those who hold these doctrines. This unity can only be maintained by the active and continuous participation of alert and interested groups in the affairs of their country and their church.
