REGIMENT IN HALIFAX**

Under the recently issued militia regulations the rates of pay for the new corps in Halifax Garrison will be as follows:

Applicants for enlistment in the corps must be British subjects of good character, unmarried, between the ages of 18 and 45, not less than 5 ft. 5 in. in height and 34 inches measure round the chest. The pay of warrant and N. C. officers and men will be as follows:

The non-coms. and men are to receive per day as rations, 1 lb. bread, 1 lb. meat, 1 lb. potatoes, 2 oz. cheese, 1 oz. pot barley, 1 1/2 oz. coffee, 1 1/2 oz. tea, 2 oz. sugar, 1 1/2 oz. salt, pepper and also get barracks accommodation and medical attendance.

They will also be allowed good conduct pay, acting bombardiers, lance corporals, gunners and privates at the rate of 2 cents per day for the first year's service, 3 cents per day for the second and 4 cents per day for the third, to be paid at the termination of engagement, and on re-engagement for three years 5, 6 and 7 cents per day for each succeeding year.

They will get on joining a free kit, consisting of cloth and serge tunics and trousers, forage and winter caps, muffler, 2 pairs boots, 1 pair wolver gloves; an allowance of \$3 per year after the first year's service will be granted each soldier to enable him to keep up his winter kit. They will also be supplied free on joining with regimental necessaries, to be kept in serviceable order at the soldier's expense during his period of service, as follows: 3 gray shirts, 2 knitted shirts, buttons, shaving, cloth, hair and shoe brushes, razor, knife, fork and spoon, button stick, hold all, comb, sponge, 2 pairs drawers, 1 box blacking, 3 towels, 4 pairs socks, 1 pair braces.

After twenty years service and upwards

soldiers will become entitled on discharge to pension for life, varying from 16 cents to \$1.16 per day, according to rank and length of service. Soldiers who complete not less than 15 years service and are incapacitated through infirmity of mind and body will be entitled to retire and receive a pension for life.

Whether or not militia service will count in pension service is not known here.
