The Council are asked to state what they have done in the matter for the information of the next convention of the Union which is to be held at Saskatoon next month. On inquiry yesterday a Guardian reporter learned that up to the present the City Council have taken no action in the matter, though the matter is in the hands of the Finance Committee of the Council.

LONDON, July 15.—Lord Deedes, husband of Helen Gould brings an action for heavy damage against a big firm of London contractors. His charges are highly sensational.

IMPEACHMENT OF CHINA'S MINISTERS

PEKING, July 14.—The house of representatives to-day passed the first reading of bills impeaching the minister of war, Tuan Chu-Jui, who is the acting premier, and the ministers of finance and the navy, Chow Heuh-Hsi and Liu-Kiang-Hsun respectively. The charges against the ministers of war and finance are in connection with the conclusion of the contract

for an Austrian loan. The minister of the navy is charged with acting unconstitutionally. Another bill impeaching the cabinet collectively also passed its first reading.

President Yuan Shi Kai has ordered reinforcement dispatched to the province of Kiang-Si, where the cashed governor-general, Hwang-Hsing is leading rebellious troops. Heavy fighting has been going on at Kiu-Kiang, where the insurgent forces number 9,000. The blowing up of a

fort and other anti-government acts, indicate that the "young China" party is determined to force the issue.

THE TEACHERS ARE INCREASING.

TORONTO, July 15.—Despite the allurements of the west the supply of school teachers in Ontario is steadily increasing. At the close of the school year ending in June there were 11,248 teachers, a gain of nearly 400.

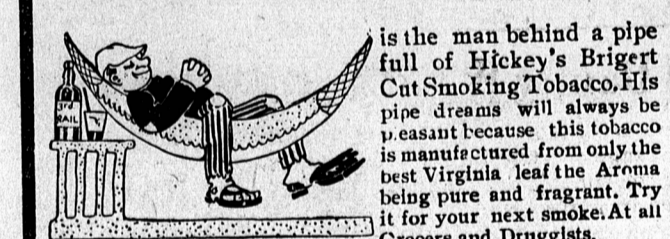
