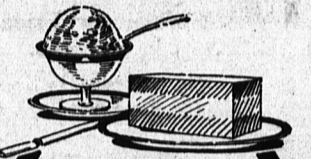

I have also had the pleasure of meeting Messrs Buxton and Bowness as they enlisted from McGill in the same Co., being a student there for two years, but decided it was my duty to take my place among those young men for the defence of my King and country. ### VIOLENT BOMBARDMENT AROUND VERDUN

PARIS, May 8.—Violent bombardment in the region of Hill 304, Northwest of Verdun, was continued last night but there was no resumption of infantry fighting, according to this afternoon's bulletin from the war office. The repulse of a strong German reconnaissance south of St. Mihiel and a successful surprise attack on a patrolling force near Lanfroicourt in Lorraine are also reported and also the breakdown of a strong German attack on French trenches in South Lorraine. They were stopped by our curtain of fire and their forces dispersed before they reached our entanglements.

In the region of Verdun the night marked only by continuous and violent bombardment in the region of Hill 304 and of the Hautremont sector at Thlaumont Farm. South of St. Mihiel we repulsed a strong enemy reconnaissance which attempted to attack one of our small posts east of Bisle. In Lorraine we surprised a patrol which had crossed the Selloe River near Lanfroicourt Southeast of Nomeny. We brought back with us fourteen prisoners. During the course of a wind squall the day before yesterday 20 of our captive balloons broke away from their moorings, most of the observers were able to descend back of our lines through the use of their parachutes. We are without news of a few of them who were carried into the enemy's lines.

### STOCK NOTE.

Mr. Bertram Brown of York has recently purchased from Andrew McRae & Son of East Royalty a yearling Ayrshire bull that should mean a lot to the dairymen of his vicinity. This bull is out of Milk Maid 7th, and after Mr. McRae's imported bull which has always been a winner, wherever shown. His dam Milk Maid 7th has for some years held the Canadian Ayrshire record with 16697 pounds of milk and 729 pounds of butter fat making over 860 pounds of butter. Last year she was again entered in the test and produced very nearly 18,000 pounds of milk and between 750 and 775 pounds of butter fat. Her former calf was sold for \$500 to Laurie Bros. of Malvern, Ontario, and at the Toronto Exhibition in one of the largest classes ever held he won the first prize as a yearling Ayrshire and was held as a reserve for championship. Mr. Brown is to be congratulated on securing this bull. While we are pleased to note the sale of high priced live stock to Ontario farmers, we much prefer to see it sold to farmers of Prince Edward Island. The Ayrshire breeders of York are certainly very fortunate in having such a high class bull within easy reach and it is to be hoped that Mr. Brown will be encouraged in every way possible to own such valuable breeding stock.

There was foaled at Nina Mile Creek on April 21st a handsome filly the property of John A. McDonald. The sire was the noted Zombro—Morgan Stallion Harry T. 2.16 1/4, owned by G. W. Handrhan, City. The Dam of this filly was by Parkwood 2.21 1/4. A grand combination of blood.
