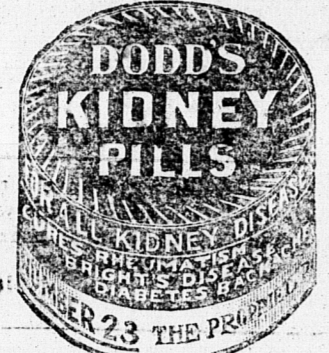

BARRE STRIKERS MAKE DEMANDS.

BARRE, March 19—The 1,000 strikers of the Barre Wool Combing Company, Ltd., and the Norway Wool Combing Company held an open air meeting today and formulated demands on the mill owners:

Those getting \$5.50 or less a week or more an increase of one cent an hour; time and a quarter for overtime; no discrimination against strikers.

Louis Nelson of Chicago, labor leader and organizer of the I. W. W., presided. After the meeting, Deputy Chief Neil, who is acting the part of mediator between the mill owners and the strikers, conferred with Chairman Nelson and tried to arrange a meeting of the factions.

As the railroad employes refused to run on the spur track from Barre Plains, because of the danger of violence, the mill men were compelled to cart wool a mile to the freight shed at Barre Plains. The superintendent of the Wool Combing Company declares they will continue to ship in that manner. Their wagons were guarded by special officers, armed. There was no disturbance. Ten or fifteen strike breakers are at work in the combing plant. They had to move freight cars by hand inside the yard.

The Ware police sent word they could not detail the promised police because a strike was threatened there. The same word from Warren.

The twenty Worcester police went home today. They will be succeeded by twenty-five Metropolitan policemen.

WASHINGTON, March 19—Elwyn C. Preston of Boston is here today urging that some action be taken upon the bill for a supplemental \$350,000 appropriation for the Boston Customhouse. He claims that too large an amount of money is being used up in the rental of temporary quarters. Congressman Curley will confer with Wallace L. Pierce in Boston and in returning will try, with other members of the Massachusetts delegation, to hasten action in the committee in public buildings and grounds on this measure.
