BOOMING REVENUE

Receipts Two Million
Over Last Year

OUTLAY IS INCREASED

And Capital Expenditure
Very Large—Trackmen's
Strike About Off.

REVENUE GAINED TWO MILLIONS.
OTTAWA, August 10.—(Special.)—Returns for the fiscal year ending June 30th just issued show a total revenue of \$52,010,000, compared with \$50,002,475 last year.

EXPENDITURE AND CAPITAL ACCOUNT.
The expenditures returns are not all in, but the figures show \$44,187,046.

The capital expenditure was nearly ten and a half millions, an increase of a million and three quarters over the previous year.

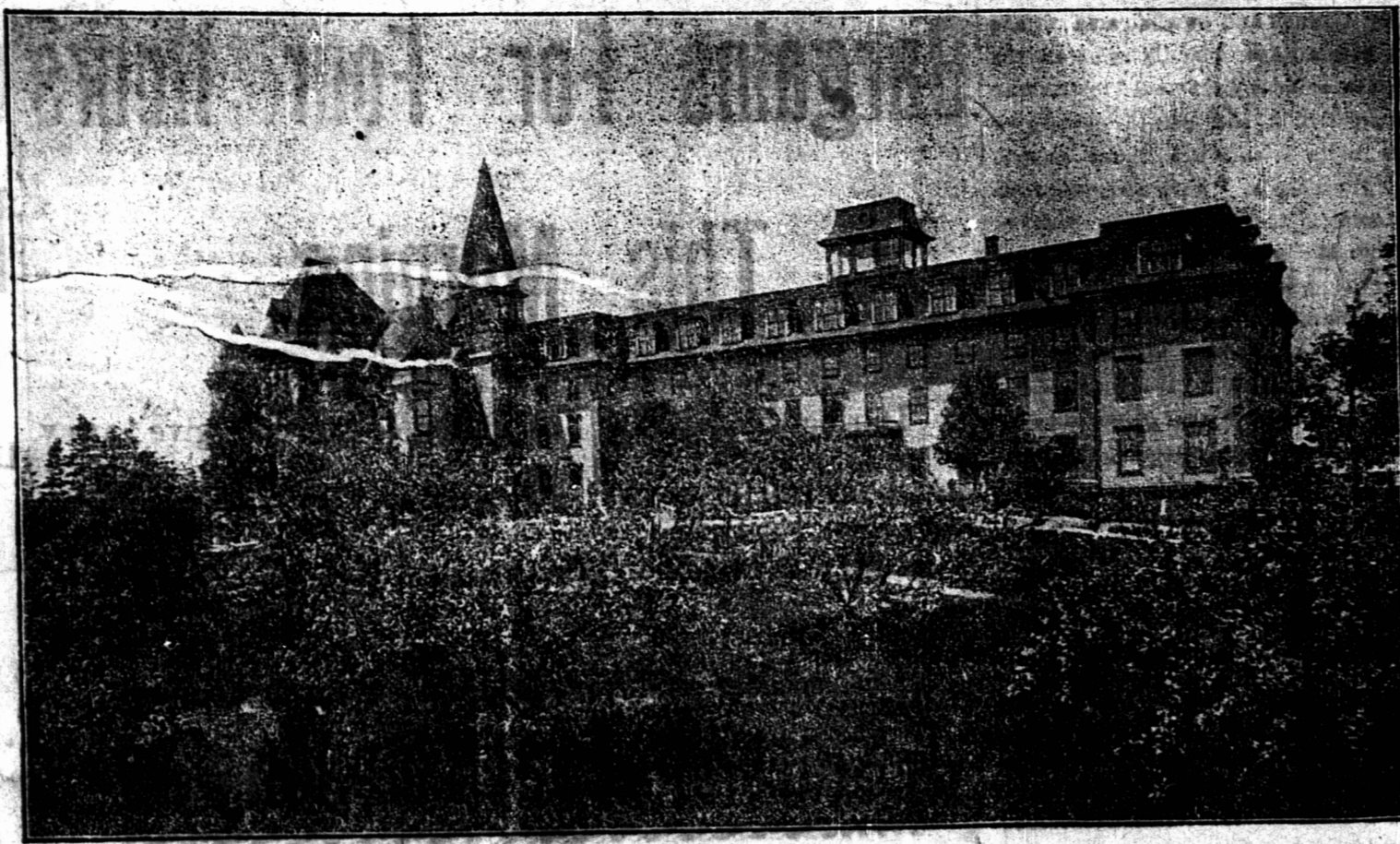

LADIES' COLLEGE AND CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC.

MT. ALLISON EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy was founded in 1843, and is the oldest of the educational institutions at Sackville N. B. While the establishment of the Ladies' College and still later the Mount Allison University withdrew from the Academy, much of the scholastic work before carried on in that institution, it has continued to perform its important functions as a preparatory school for boys in which a high standard of efficiency has been maintained. Although it is conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles, the denominational control under which it is placed furnishes a sufficient guarantee that every effort is made to secure the moral and spiritual welfare of the students.

The Academy residence is large, beautifully situated, and each room is warmed by means of hot water radiators and is

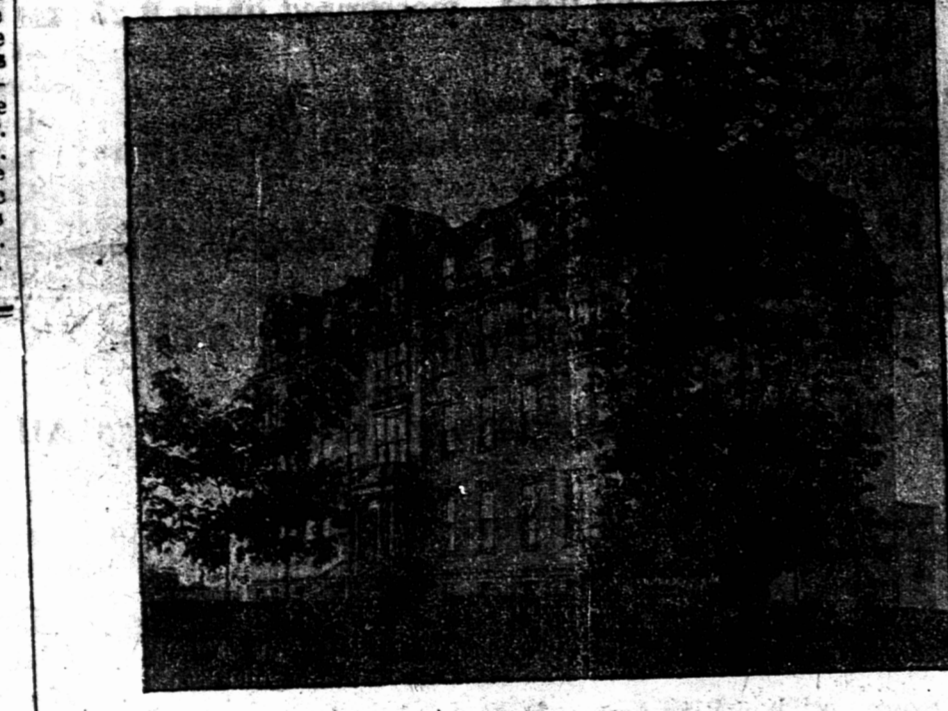

In 1891 he assumed the position he now occupies as principal of Mount Allison Academy and during his seven years of service in this institution he has always associated with him men whose scholarship and teaching experience rendered them worthy of confidence. The dining room is large and attractive, bright and cheery, with home-like furnishings. A well-equipped gymnasium is provided and is in charge of a competent teacher in athletics.

Some ten years ago a complete Business College was organized in connection with the Academy. By reason of this connection students in this Business College have advantages which are to be found in no purely commercial school, as the academic classes are open to them and a much better training is secured in branches of great importance to a business man. The commercial course is very complete, extending from the simplest methods of book-keeping to the work of a public accountant.

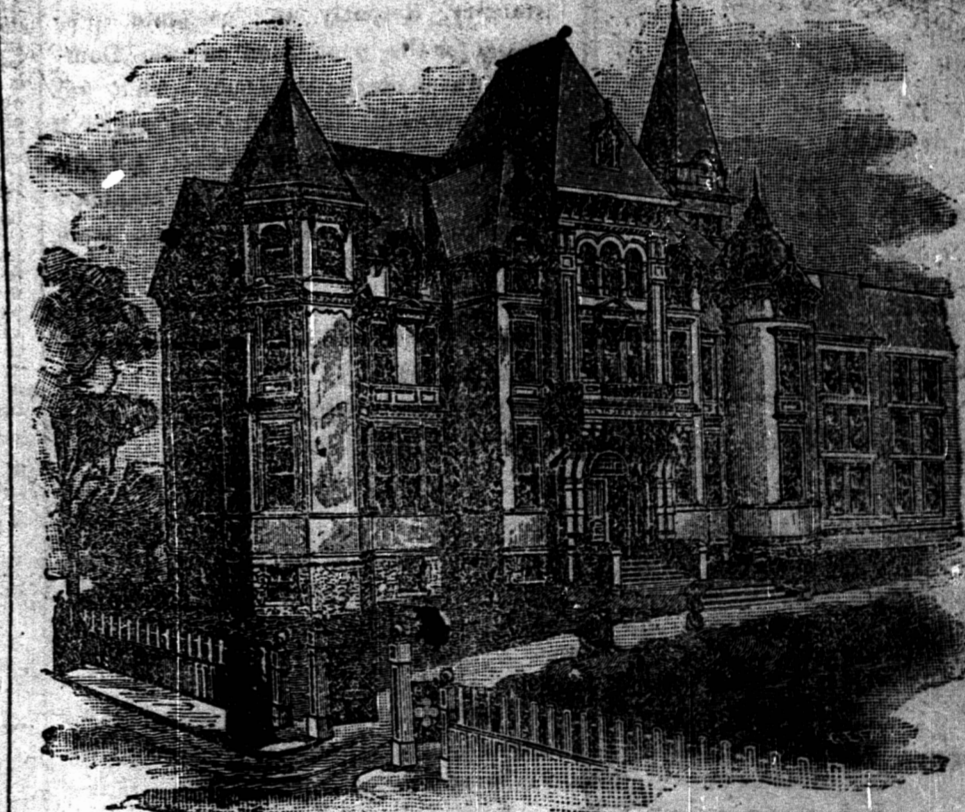
PLENTY OF SALMON IN B. C.
