**YACHT RACE TODAY 2 P. M.**

An executive meeting of the Charlottetown Yacht Club was held at the Navy League Rooms and was called to order at 8 o'clock, the Commodore presiding, the following members of the Executive being absent: I. Y. Reddin, J. Hearn and D. F. Bethune.

On motion the following were appointed to act as sailing committee for the season: Frank McDonald, John Lund, and John Hearn. Mr. James King kindly agreed to assist the committee in the capacity of timer.

The following committee on measurements was on motion appointed: John Flynn, Jack Lund, and Gordon Esery. It was agreed that the sail area measurements of all boats competing last season be accepted for this season.

The matter of a race course was fully discussed and it was suggested that the sailing committee adopt the short course, with two hour time limit, the course being especially popular from the spectators standpoint. It was also suggested that a course giving the boats a beat to windward and return be given consideration.

It was decided that the first race of the season be sailed on June 12th, the race being given to the Rovers who will give the boats a chance for a work out, and a final trimming up for the first cup race on June 12th, when a series of five races for the handsome cup donated by Mr. B. Roy Holman will commence.

On motion it was decided that any three complete races out of the five, will count as a full series. This will save re-sailing, postponed races, or any not finished in time allowance.

The matter of prizes and cups was discussed, with the idea of arranging, so as to give all boats a chance of winning, and thus keeping up the interest for all boats both fast and slow. With this in view, it was decided that for the first cup series a chance prize be also competed for.

On motion it was decided that a series for a cup, donated by the Commodore, to be known as the Commodore's Cup Race, be sailed in the evening, one race a week, first race to be called about the end of June, the exact date to be decided at the regular June meeting of the Club.

On motion it was decided that Code Flag "B" be adopted and used as official protest flag for the season.

It was decided that the dates for the sailing of races for cups donated by Mr. J. O. Hyndman, Mr. Lloyd Welther, and Mr. John Hearn be decided and arrangements for same completed at next meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

It was not known definitely last night as to the number of yachts that would cross the line today, but among those will be: P. No. J. King and A. Campbell, Zenith—Malcolm Irwin, Sheba—Vincent McQuaid, "Governor's Island" Rob Roy—Miller Mathieson.

It is expected that a number of other yachts will make their appearance before the starting gun including the Barney Google, Sheik and others.

**ROVERS TAKE ANCHORS INTO CAMP, SCORE 5-1**

North Enders Come Back Strong in Sixth To Score Four Runs, With Added Tally in Seventh—Four Hurlers Used Large Attendance.

For the second time within a week, the Anchors, leading all the way until within a "stone's throw" of victory were forced to relinquish the popular verdict, this time to the Rovers, who defeated them last evening at Abegweit Grounds by a score of 5 to 1.

The attendance last evening was well up to the standard maintained so far in the league, fully fifteen hundred spectators crowding the main stand and bleachers.

Until the last of the sixth it was a wonderful game to watch, with lots of batting and excellent fielding by both sides, the score remaining in the "anybody" column, with the Rovers working as they never worked before on the short end of the one to nil count. Further still it looked like additional scores for the Anchors when Connors, plucky young Rover hurler weakened in the first of the sixth, when D. Diamond sent a scorching hit at him for a fumble; McGuigan followed with a deep single, McEachern pulled in the right time to take the mound himself, holding the "Down Westers" on a threatening rally.

Four pitchers were used in the game, when the Rovers after filling the bags in their half of the sixth forced McFarlane to abdicate after hurling great ball until then; Hobbs replacing him however was unable to keep the ball clear of North Enders, with the result that four runs crossed the plate before the all out signal was given. Erratic fielding coupled with inaccurate throwing to the plate was the Anchor downfall last evening.

Last evening's game was the fourth played so far in the City League and it is creditable to state that the brand of ball shown by the teams so far is praiseworthy, and it is a safe prediction that before the schedule closes record attendances will reach the three thousand mark, equalling anything of this kind in the Maritime Provinces.

**Game By Innings**

First Inning, Anchors—E. Diamond leading off is thrown out by McTague; Cronin following, singles to right field, Francis takes a passed ball while Cronin annexes second, Francis is out when Connors scoops a hot grounder; Cronin goes to third, and scores when "Dutchy" Diamond singles to deep Rover crew.

McGuigan next, batter is safe on McTague's fumble of a fast one and goes to second on the throw; Diamond stealing third, Saunders finds Connors only to be thrown out by Williams.

Rovers—McInnis romps to first on McFarlane's fumble, and steals second after a hard run on the first pitched ball to Williams, the next batter, Williams fanned, Nash followed at bat to hit ground ball to McFarlane and is safe on the throw; McInnis on a steal to third is caught on Diamond's throw from first, McEachern misses his time at bat when Nash is nailed at second on an attempted steal.

Score—Anchors 1; Rovers 0.

Second Inning, Anchors—Art McDonald singles to right and steals second; McMahon grounds out to Williams' fumble, Francis third on the sacrifice, McFarlane flies to McInnis and the side is retired when Preston Diamond makes a spectacular catch of "Dempsey's" foul ball.

Rovers—McEachern comes through with a single, P. Diamond flies to Saunders, while McEachern works hard to get back to first on the throw, Blanchard, next to steal third, and once more a score is nipped in the bud when McGuigan flies to McEachern.

Rovers—Only three men faced McFarlane in this half when Connors fans; McInnis is thrown out by McGuigan and Williams takes three "healthy" ones.
