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NAVIGATION SCHOOL TO OPEN IN CHARLOTTETOWN

This Decision Arrived at by Navy League and Services of a Thoroughly Qualified British Officer Secured. Rifles Ordered from England and Additional Uniforms.

At the last regular monthly meeting of the P. E. Island Branch of the Navy League one of the important matters considered was the opening of a navigation school in Charlottetown and the application of Lieut. Commander W. G. Lewin, R. N. R., as instructor was accepted. Lieut. Commander Lewin has already had considerable experience in instructing Canadians as he was placed by the Admiralty in charge of the Navigation School at Devonport, England, and instructed all the Canadians in the overseas division, R. N. C. V. R., who went through for higher ratings. In all some 200 Canadian boys passed through his hands and qualified for trawler skippers and mates during the war. It is expected that the navigation school will open before the 1st of

December. This school will be open to the Maritime Provinces and will be one of the best institutions of the kind in Canada. It is expected that Lt. Commander Lewin will arrive here about September 1st, and arrangements will be made to have him give lectures at the various shipping centres of the Province. This province is to be congratulated upon securing the services of such an experienced officer and without doubt his appointment will result in awakened interest in Maritime matters and prove of much benefit. An order was placed with the Admiralty for 60 Winchester carbines for the Boys Naval Brigade. It was found impossible to procure these rifles in Canada. Thirty additional uniforms have also been ordered.

Roosevelt Nominated For Vice-Presidency

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, New York, assistant Secretary of the Navy, was nominated for Vice President by the Democratic National Convention and became the running mate of Governor James M. Cox of Ohio.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—A disposition to be elated over the nomination of James M. Cox for President and Franklin D. Roosevelt for Vice-President exists among the chief men of the Democratic party at the close of the National Convention. The wounds of the spirited battle over the selection of the Presidential candidate, have not had time to heal but those who opposed the nomination of Ohio's governor have found balm in the action of the Convention today in choosing the young Assistant-Secretary of the Navy for second place on the Democratic ticket. It is not the Roosevelt name alone, a name that they hope to conjure with, that causes the delegates to whiff a smell of victory. With keener nostrils they are of the opinion that the ticket has been buttressed mightily by the Roosevelt addition for reasons that are complimentary to the New Yorker's own personality more than to the fact that he bears a name which appeals to the American people. Perhaps no other decision of the Convention could have been more popular than his selection.

SIR THOMAS WHITE WOULD DECLINE THE LEADERSHIP

In an Interview Emphatically Repeats That He Would Not Accept Leadership if Offered.

TORONTO, July 6.—Sir Thomas White definitely stated tonight that he could not accept the leadership of the government, even if it should be offered to him. He arrived here this evening from Muskoka and is on his way to Ottawa where he has been asked as a Privy Councillor and Member of Parliament to confer on the political situation. To a representative of the Canadian Press he repeated the statement which he has made on several occasions that he was not a candidate for any offices in the Government and that his name was not available for consideration. He said that he retired from the government a year ago on the grounds, first, that his health had been seriously impaired by the continued strain of his official duties and, second, because of the pressing necessity of re-habilitating his private affairs which, during his period of office, he had been obliged to neglect. He would not allow business of a financial consideration to stand in the way of public duty but the matter of health was different. As the public was there involved it was clear that he does not regard himself as physically fit to undertake the heavy duties and responsibilities of the Premiership, even if the post had been offered to him which he made it very plain was not the case.

Canada Contributes To Typhus Fund

LONDON, July 6.—The Secretary of the League of Nations intimates that the Canadian government has decided to contribute \$200,000 to the league campaign against typhus in Central Europe.

They say that Sir Thomas White will be asked to accept the leadership and that if he refuses there is nothing left for the Premier to do but name Hon. Arthur Meighen to the Governor. If the latter asks Sir Robert's advice.

Still Probing Elwell Murder

Disorder In Tokio Legislature

TOKIO, July 7.—There was considerable disorder in the House of Representatives today following charges made by Mr. Shimada that Minister Finance Takahashi and Minister of Commerce, Yamamoto, had enriched themselves by stock gambling previous to the recent financial slump. Shimada based his assumptions on the newspaper articles which alleged heavy sales of sugar and shipping stocks.

Setting Handicaps

S. S. Lake Elwin Safely Beached

HALIFAX, N. S., July 7.—The United States shipping board steamer Lake Elwin, Captain Beverley (which struck an uncharted submerged rock six miles off Eddy Point Monday afternoon, was beached at Sandy Point just inside Editorial Point. She is in no danger and will likely be refloated.

Ontario Government Holds Radial Works

TORONTO, July 6.—Ontario's Farmer-Labor government holds up all hydraulic projects. In a carefully drawn and detailed statement the government yesterday made known its policy. The statement contains the government side of the case and the argument presented throughout the entire document is against radical schemes. To get further opinion and further information the government has decided to name a Commission to investigate and report on the radial situation. In the meantime all action in the direction of further outlays or the assumption of further responsibilities in radial matters by the Hydro-Electric Commission will be stayed, says the official statement issued by the authority of Premier Drury.

Wireless Phone Across Atlantic

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 6.—Preparations are being made at Signal Hill for the coming demonstration of the scientific wonder of the age—namely speaking from the oldest Colony to the Mother Country by telephone. The object is to have the steamer Victorian on which the British Press delegation are coming across in constant communication with the land on either side from the day they leave Liverpool till they arrive at Halifax. English engineers are now here erecting the plant.

Manitoba Gov't. Will Not Be Dissolved

WINNIPEG, July 7.—The Evening Free Press says it was stated at the Parliament buildings today that unofficial conversations between the Lieutenant Governor and the Provincial Cabinet Minister, indicated clearly that Sir James Aitkins would not grant another dissolution of the House unless it was rendered necessary by a Government defeat or resignation.

Krassin's Version Of Visit To England

LONDON, July 6.—A Copenhagen dispatch to the Labor Herald declared Gregory Krassin, Soviet Trade Representative to England was bringing a note from Lloyd George to the Moscow Government, proposing that England and Russia cease action against each other. The note makes no mention of debts contracted by the Russian Government under the Czar, the dispatch adds.

Turks Capture Town of Feicos

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 6.—Turkish National forces occupied Feicos on the Asiatic shore of the Bosphorus, according to a statement issued today by British headquarters here. They captured Feicos bringing the Nationalist troops, within ten miles of Constantinople.

Greek Troops Advancing

PARIS, July 7.—Greek troops are advancing north of Lake Arin and will join the British at Mudania. Bulgarian regulars are mobilizing on the Greek frontier. It is thought general mobilization is the objective.

Turkish Nationalists Retreating

ATHENS, July 7.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha's Turkish nationalist forces were withdrawn and are retreating towards Olympus and mountain regions south, as a result of Allied troops landing on the coast, a communiqué issued by Greek headquarters today says.

Brotherly Message Kindly Remembered

SHANGHAI, July 7.—"If you are attacked I shall come to your assistance with every man and every gun." This message from Great Britain to the United States at the time the American sailors landed at Yochow, Admiral Cleave's quotation in his Independence Day address. This message, he said, was read by Admiral Borrett, commanding the British fleet at Yangtze River to Captain Kearney, American missionary who was killed during General Chang's march at "This message," Admiral Cleave said, "should go down in history with the epigram that blood is thicker than water."

Turkey Must Now Toe the Mark
