C. B. Boards Of Trade Present Coal Brief

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 23 (CP) - The Associated Boards of Trade of Cape Breton island today placed before the Carroll Commission, investigating the Canadian coal industry, a seven-point plan for maintaining and extending the Cape Breton coal mines.

The Board of Trade brief was presented by Johnstone O'Neil of Glace Bay, N.S. It called for: 1. Extended surveys to determine the feasibility of opening new mines or re-opening old ones with a view to providing employment for men now in the armed forces.

2. Closer co-operation between the producer, merchant and lower costs. 3. Construction of a crossing at the Strait of Canso between Cape Breton Island and the mainland.

4. Continuance on a permanent basis under statute of subsidies, subventions and tariffs necessary to displace imported coal and give marketing coal access to its "natural markets."

5. Extended research into the possibilities of developing coal by-products. 6. Government assistance for the establishment of large scale by-product plants in the centre of the coal mining areas.

7. Extension of powers of the Dominion Fuel Board or the creation of new board with wider authority. The place of Maritime coal in the Ontario market was discussed by Mr. Frawley with both Mr. Gordon and Mr. Chew. The Commission counsel drew Mr. Gordon's attention to the fact that the coal situation was analogous to that of the pulp industry.

Mr. Chew agreed with a suggestion of Mr. Frawley that regarding national boundaries and considering only geographic conditions Ontario would appear to be a natural market for Oide and Pennsylvania, rather than Nova Scotia coal. Under such circumstances, Mr. Chew said, Nova Scotia would find a natural outlet in the New England states where under present conditions a market was not now available.

U. S. Announces Drastic Textile, Clothing Program

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP) - The United States Government today announced a drastic textile and clothing program designed to cut consumer costs six to seven per cent and to increase supplies of low-and medium-priced essential garments.

The plan, affecting blanketing mills, clothing manufacturers and dealers—and admittedly "tough" on them—was announced at a joint news conference by Chairman J.A. Krug of the War Production Board, Price Administrator Chester Bowles.

The price cuts and increase in supplies are expected by late spring, they said.

The joint control will channel 75 per cent of all civilian fabric into government agencies.

W.P.B. to avert what Mr. Krug called "a very serious supply situation" ahead.

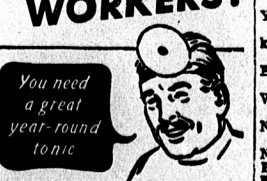
