**ASSASSINS AND HEROES.**

A large meeting was held in New York, shortly after the assassination of the Grand Duke Sergius, at which the enthusiasm over the assassin and his deed was apparently greater than the desire for Russian liberty in behalf of which the meeting appears to have been called. More than one speaker argued in defence the slaying of "tyrants." The slayer of Sergius was exalted as a hero. The editor of the Socialist newspaper, Forward, said, "The fighting organization does not use bombs too often," and there was much more of the same sort of inflammatory language which appears to have been applauded to the echo. The feeling which prompted the applause was doubtless based in part on the fact that Sergius was a bad man and a tyrant. Nobody seems to have a good word to say for Sergius.

And yet it would be appalling if the world should come to justify the assassination even of tyrants. If we assert the right of a Russian revolutionist to slay a Czar or a Grand Duke with a bomb and assume that the end justifies the means, where shall we end? If good men in a good cause slay bad men, will not bad men slay good men with even greater certainty and frequency? It may be doubted if ever yet assassination has helped forward any good cause. Both

possibly thought that Lincoln was objectionable or dangerous. The half insane Guiteau and Czolgosz, the slayers of Garfield and McKinley, like Booth, took the like bloody short-cut to forbidden ends, and their memory survives only in the execration of mankind. The murders of President Carnot of France and of the Czar Alexander II equally go to show that whether the cause which the slayer had at heart were good or bad that cause was not forwarded by the deed of blood. And surely these assassins cannot be dignified with the name of heroes.

The murdered Czar Alexander showed a greater disposition than any Russian autocrat before or since his time to give liberty to his people. He freed the serfs and showed in many ways a disposition to rule humanely and mercifully. Almost beyond question the crime which removed him, committed in the name of liberty, put back the cause of Russian freedom a quarter of a century. If it were now possible to remove the Czar and all the Grand Dukes by like means, and establish a constitutional monarchy or a republic in Russia, there would arise some Anarchist, to whom all Governments, whether despotic or liberal are equally abominable, who would throw a bomb under the carriage of the new ruler. What would be said of him? If we begin to justify assassination there is no stopping place. The crime of the assassin is not, cannot be heroic. It is cowardly and base. Even the rattlesnake gives warning before he strikes. Freedom's battle must be fought in the open, not with treachery and murder.

**SEPARATE SCHOOLS.**

It is interesting to note that in all the territory of the new Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta there are now only sixteen separate schools and ten only of these are Roman Catholic. As the population is estimated at half a million the small number of minority schools existing indicates that there is little desire within the new Provinces to have the separate school system perpetuated. Moreover these schools have not increased rapidly. Fourteen years ago when the population was but a fraction of what it is to-day there were fourteen separate schools. Now there are only two more of them. In the same period the public schools have increased in number from five hundred to more than one thousand. The moving cause for perpetuating separate schools in the new Provinces lies not within those Provinces but outside.

**WAVE FORTY FEET HIGH.**

LONDON February 22.—From Melbourne comes the story of an extraordinary tidal wave which was encountered by two outward bound British ships. During her passage across the Southern ocean, the Meinwen, from Liverpool, was almost engulfed in an immense tidal wave. She was off St. Paul's Island, sailing before moderate westerly breezes, when a mountainous wave, estimated at about 40 feet high, rose over her stern and fell with a terrible crash upon the poop and swept the vessel's full length. Deck fittings were carried away and the cabin was gutted. Several of the crew sustained serious injuries, being bruised and half drowned.
