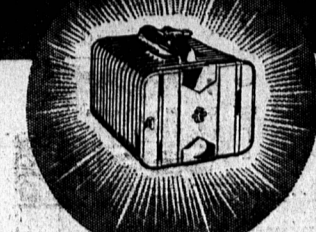

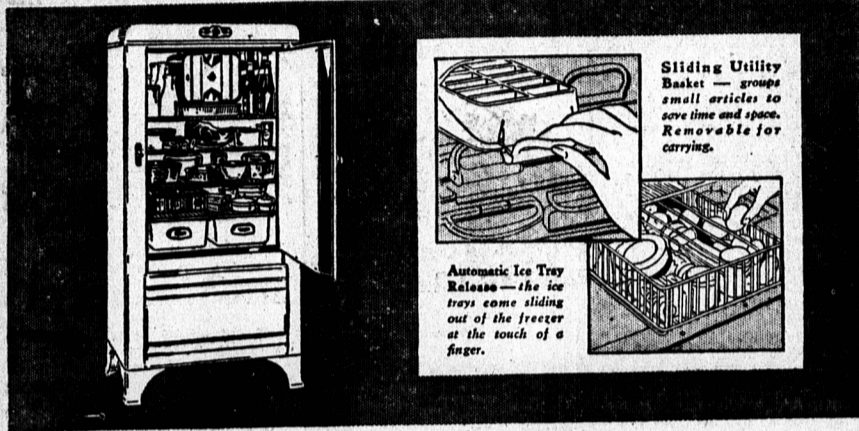

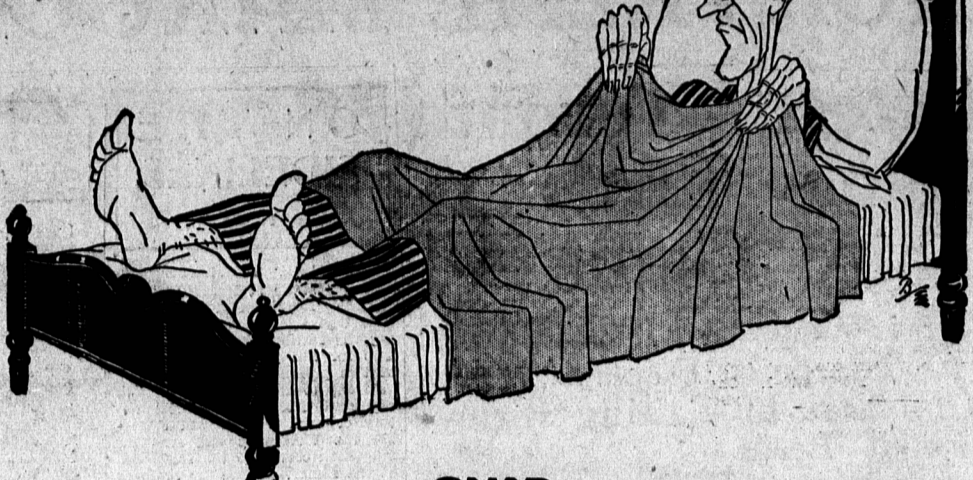

### Leo Murphy, 43, Believed Dying At Port Jervis

The following clipping from a New York exchange refers to Mr. Leo Murphy brother of Mr. Mitchell Murphy of New Haven, P. E. I.—Leo Murphy, aged 43, believed to be a soldier from this city, is dying in a Port Jervis, N. Y. hospital, as the result of an accident there yesterday afternoon, in which he suffered the loss of his left leg while boarding a train.

Meanwhile Haverhill police are searching for a woman named C. Burke, whose picture was found in a wallet on Murphy's person, together with her address, which was General Delivery, Haverhill, Mass. While the 1855 Haverhill directory shows three women named C. Burke none of them have General Delivery addresses.

Word of Murphy's accident and a request that the local police endeavor to locate the Burke woman came from the New York State police station at Monroe, N. Y. It was relayed by phone from the Massachusetts State police, who obtained their message via teletype from New York.

From the contents of Murphy's pockets, it is believed by the New York troopers that he is a member of the Tenth U. S. Infantry, a colored regiment, with station at Panama. He was described as 43 years of age, five feet, six inches

and 145 pounds. He had blue eyes, but no other physical characteristics were conveyed by the New York authorities.

The latter said in their message that Murphy was trying to board a train at Port Jervis, when he fell in some manner and was run over. He was rushed to the Port Jervis hospital where his left leg was promptly amputated, and his name placed on the danger list.

Police here were puzzled last night by the military description of Murphy. There are only four colored regiments the 24th and 25th Infantry, Ninth and Tenth Cavalry, in the Army. None of them is in Panama. The Tenth U. S. Infantry is a white regiment located at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

However, there is stationed at West Point Military academy, which is close to Port Jervis, the Second Squadron of the Tenth Cavalry one of the colored regiments. It is presumed that Murphy is a member of this outfit.

Capt. William A. Gavin said last night that the police would check up today with the postal authorities in an effort to locate C. Burke in this city.

Leo Murphy, age 43, who is in a serious condition in a hospital, in Port Jervis, N. Y., is believed to be the brother of Mrs. Catherine Burke, 94 Cedar street, whom she has not seen or heard from for the last 15 or 17 years. He also has another sister, Miss Mary Murphy, living at 22 Columbia park, and a brother, Richard, living at 20 Seventh avenue.

A picture, bearing the name C. Burke, and the address, General Delivery, Haverhill, Mass., led to a search for relatives in his city, but relatives were not located until Deputy Marshal O. McKenna received a tip which led the police to question Mrs. Burke.

The two sisters and brother were taken to the police station after being located by Inspector Calvin E. Long, and had a direct telephone conversation with the officials of the New York hospital. The injured man gave them names of his two sisters and brother living in this city and the name of his father and mother. He said that his brother, Richard, lived in Canada, the last he knew, but Richard since moved to this city from Canada. As a result of the telephone conversation Mrs. Burke and her sister and brother were positive that the injured man is their brother.

From the contents of the injured man's pockets, the New York officials believed that he was connected with the 10th U. S. Infantry, a colored regiment, which was stationed in Panama. Mrs. Burke told the Haverhill police that her brother left his home in New Haven, Prince Edward Island, 15 or 17 years ago to join the U. S. army, and served in Panama, but that she had not heard from him since, and did not know whether or not he had left the army.

According to report received by the local authorities Murphy suffered the loss of a leg when he fell under the wheels of a train in Port Jervis, N. Y.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., April 9.—The liner "Lady Hawkins" Canadian National Steamships, Capt. R. A. Clarke, arrived at Saint John Tuesday morning bringing round trip cruise passengers from British Guiana and the British West Indies via Bermuda and Boston. Passengers on board included Miss E. E. Foster, Charlottetown, P.E.I. The cargo consists of molasses, bananas, citrus fruit, fresh vegetables, coconuts, canned beef and general.

Following discharge of cargo at Saint John the "Lady Hawkins" will proceed to Halifax to complete unloading and prepare for return voyage with round trip cruise passengers from that port to the eastern group of the British West Indies and British Guiana via Boston and Bermuda on April 14th next.
