DOCTORS AND DENTISTS.

"O Nestor, pride of Greece," cries Idomeneus, "mount, mount upon thy chariot and let Machaon mount with thee! Hasten with him to our ships; for a warrior who, as he, knows how to relieve pain and cure wounds, is himself worth a thousand other heroes." Such was the estimation in which a great physician was held in the times of which Homer sang. For the written history of medicine covers between three and four thousand years. It is twenty-five centuries since Hippocrates prescribed to his students that noble oath which has since formed the creed of the medical profession—"words that were whispered long before Christ sailed with his fishermen by the shore of Galilee, or Caesar led his legions into Egypt."

So in the dim and misty past the young physicians, duly instructed and passed, were sworn, by Apollo, by Esculapius, by Hygiea, by Panacea and by all the gods and goddesses, and so in the ages since the duly accredited members of the profession have sworn by all that could bind the honor and the conscience of men to preserve a high ideal in the practice of the healing art. "I will prescribe such medicines as may be best suited to the cases of my patients, according to the best of my knowledge; and no temptation shall ever induce me to administer poison. I will religiously maintain the purity of my character and the honor of my art. Into whatever house I enter, I will enter it with the sole view of relieving the sick, and conduct myself with propriety towards all members of the family. If during my attendance I happen to hear of anything that should not be revealed, I will keep it a profound secret." To all this and more the doctors are sworn, and millions in all ages can attest to the fidelity with which the great obligation has been observed.

If in the ages past the best physicians were held in high regard, the same is no less true of the days in which we live. And justly so, for in the century just closed more progress has been made in every branch of the medical art than had been accomplished by all the ages that preceded. The profession has had its unworthy members, and so also there was a Judas among the Apostles. No one will discredit the Christian faith on that account, nor is the healing art or the profession of medicine to be discredited because here and there some member of the craft has fallen below the lofty Hippocratic standard. In all ages the ethics of the profession have been high, and never before was the knowledge of the human body and its manifold functions so great, or the nature of the ills that flesh is heir

to so well understood, or so many remedial agents medical and surgical at hand to be so skillfully applied as in our time.

For all these reasons we have regarded with much pleasure the meeting in our midst at the same time of the Maritime Medical Association and the Maritime Dental Association. It is an honor to our city that they have chosen to meet here, and it reflects honor also upon our resident physicians and dentists, who, we doubt not are the peers of those of the sister Provinces. It is not the language of compliment to say that the members of the two bodies are something more than ordinary men in appearance and bearing, in learning and dignity, and in the ability with which they have discussed most important topics of vital concern to the individual and to the community, even if the terms of their discussion were beyond the comprehension of the many.

It was in the nature of things that in the course of their discussions some words might be dropped to which the press could perhaps take exception, if in a critical mood, especially when the relations of the profession with the newspapers, (for the most part harmonious came under review). We are content however to assume that while the doctor and dentists are the better judges of what is fitting to the conduct of their high calling, the members of the journalistic profession—like the tribe of Finns in Bret Harte's ballad—may be left to judge of what belongs to them, and is or is not within their proper sphere of usefulness. But this by the way. We trust that the visiting doctors and dentists have enjoyed their brief stay in the Island capital, that they will carry away only the most pleasant recollections of their visit, and that they may be induced to come again many times in the future always assured of the heartiest and most hospitable welcome.

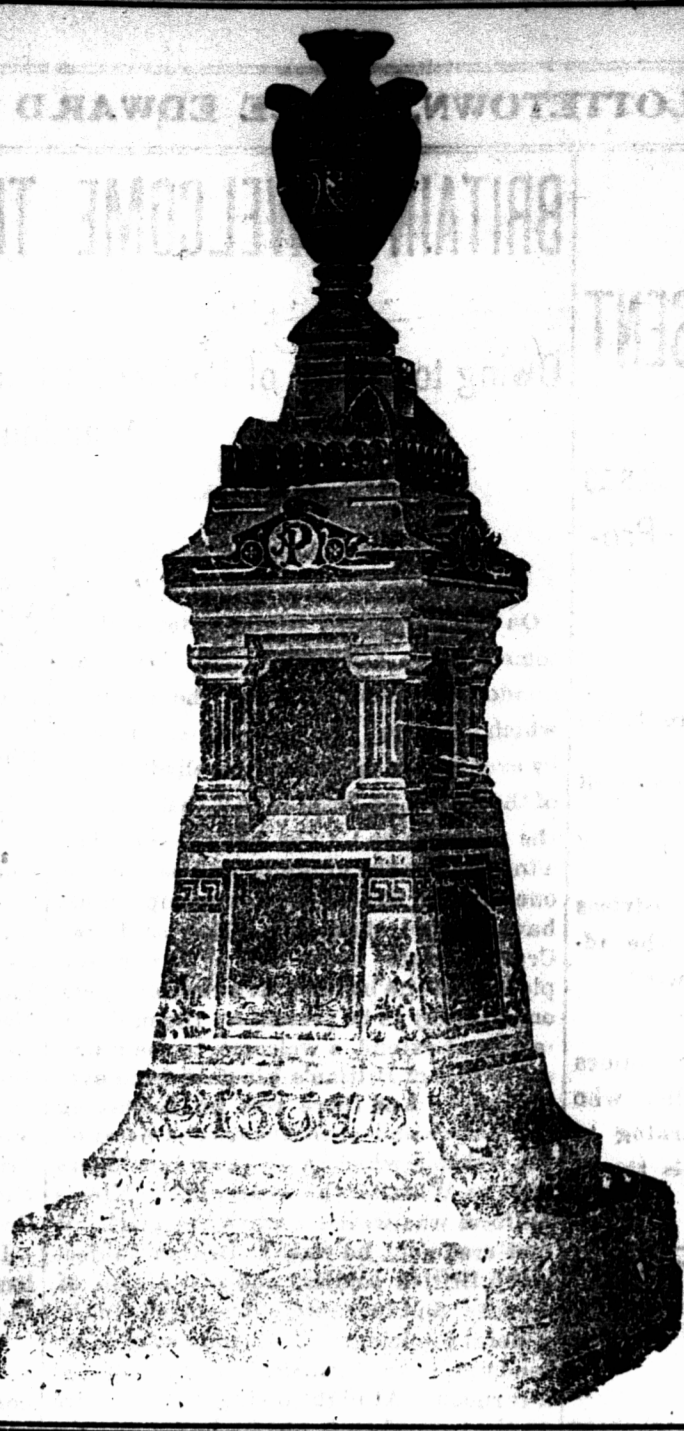
