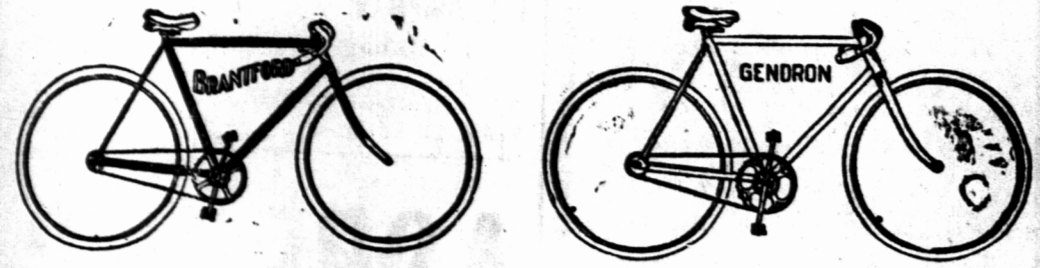

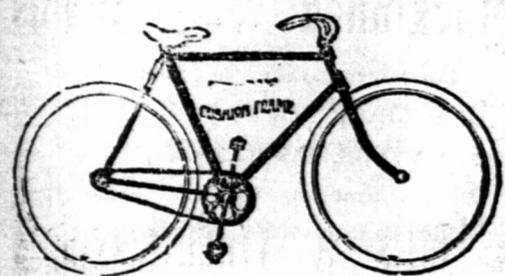

JESUS APPEARS TO PAUL.  
Acts 21, 6-16. Memory verses, 6-8  
GOLDEN TEXT.

I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision.—Acts 26, 19.

LESSON HELPS.

6. "As I made my journey"—Paul had left Jerusalem with the full intention to arrest and bring to punishment those who had professed the Christian faith. He was a young man full of zeal for the Jewish teaching, but gave way to bigotry. His journey was for ever memorable. "Unto Damascus"—This is the oldest of living cities, and has a long and eventful history. It is beautiful for location. "A great light"—At noon the sun is bright, and its rays shine in that distant land with much heat. This great light was brighter than the sun.

7. "I . . . heard a voice"—A divine manifestation of the risen and ascended Jesus. "Saul, Saul"—Observe the voice calls Paul by name. This shows knowledge, and the question must have come with startling effect "Why persecutest thou me"—Me! It was a few feeble Christians, that Saul was persecuting, but in this question Jesus makes their cause his own. Why? A question to lead to reflection. Paul knew about the Jewish creed, but not about the truth of Christ.

8. "Who art thou"—The question shows that amid all the terror Saul fully retained his consciousness. "I am Jesus of Nazareth was somewhat despised, but Jesus and his followers were Nazarenes, and yet truth was with them. Their cause despised was yet the true one. It is not the place that can make a man useful or glorious, but the man can bring honour so the place. The question ought to be not where is a man born, but what is he.

9, 10. "They heard not the voice"—But they heard a sound. Paul wants to make emphatic that a sound had for him an intelligible meaning "What shall I do, Lord"—A question which shows a subdued and willing spirit. Before this he had followed his own guidance, but now he was willing to be guided by the heavenly voice. "Arise, and go into Damascus"—A small thing to do, but he was to obey and wait for further information as to duty. Thus the path opens a little way at a time. This is true to human experience.

11. "I could not see"—Struck blind by the dazzling splendour of the light brighter than the sun.

12. "And one Ananias"—Not an apos-

tle, but an obscure Christian, but fitted for the work he was to do, for he was devout and his reputation was good. Spiritually minded, he was called to do a spiritual work.

13. "Come unto me"—But how did he come? In obedience to a divine command he was not selfless. His speech showed his spirit, for he said to the persecutor, "Brother." Why did he use this affectionate title? Because he could add, "The Lord hath sent me." He saw one before him who was blind and wretched, and who an object of divine interest, and therefore ought to be of human interest. Receive thy sight"—And Paul did, but it was the sight both of the eye and the soul for he saw a true man in one of those whom he came to persecute. He saw the true faith when he saw the face of a friend and a brother in Christ.

14. "The God of our fathers hath chosen thee"—And for a threefold purpose—to know, to hear, and to testify. He was to know the divine will concerning him; he was to hear and see Jesus so as to be an apostle, and he was to go forth a preacher of the faith which he had tried in vain to destroy.

15. "Wash away thy sins"—Show by the external and voluntary act that the Holy Spirit has pardoned your sins; that is, in a figurative sense, washed them all away.
