Salvation Army Appeal Next Fall Re Home Service

TORONTO, April 23—"Because the Canadian Government has decided that there can be no united campaign by the National War Service Organizations this year, and, further, seeing the Government has decided to finance from the Federal Treasury only the wartime work of these Organizations; therefore, the Salvation Army will find it necessary to appeal to the public for funds next Fall in order to carry on its regular Home Service Program. Commissioner Benjamin Ormes announced here today.

"This simply means we practically revert to the policy and practice which existed prior to 1941, when, at the request of the Government, the Salvation Army joined with the other War Service Organizations in one United Campaign in raising both war and Home Service requirements, which was held in March, 1941," the Commissioner explained.

"In these critical times the Salvation Army will continue to fit in and co-operate with the Dominion authorities to the fullest possible extent; hence, in accordance with the Government's policy, we cannot raise 1942 funds by a national campaign as we had done up to 1941. Instead we intend to conduct local appeals next Fall in all those communities in Canada where our work has been carried on for many years, and hope that our kind friends and supporters will give the same assistance and co-operation that they have in the past. We know they are all just as anxious to see our work continue as we are," the Commissioner concluded.

Local Speakers Unite In Urging "Yes" Vote

Premier Campbell, Hon. Dr. MacMillan and Capt. N. W. Lowther urge everyone to vote Monday to release Government from no conscription promise.

Premier Thane A. Campbell, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan and Captain N. W. Lowther united last night in an appeal to Prince Edward Island electors to vote "yes" in the plebiscite Monday. They urged everyone to vote, pointing out it was not only their privilege but their duty as citizens of a democracy to express their opinion.

The war situation was critical, they pointed out, and it was imperative that the federal government be absolutely free to act in the interests of the Dominion in prosecuting the war to the limit of the country's power.

PREMIER CAMPBELL — "At the request of Mr. J. Lester Douglas, I am very pleased to associate myself with Capt. Lowther and Dr. MacMillan in a discussion of matters pertaining to the forthcoming plebiscite.

"On Monday next, the people of Canada, although a Nation at war, will have the unique privilege of expressing, in a purely voluntary manner, their considered and conscientious opinion on a question of great national importance. Mostly the group anxious to get to the spot, willingly donated a "voluntary sum" for this service. However, this new ruling prohibits the carrying of passengers by trucks "with or without compensation."

"This is only one way the commercial truck drivers are co-operating in Canada's war effort. Another restriction, aimed at conservation of tires and gasoline, requires that every operator of a motor vehicle in respect of which a commercial category gasoline license and ration coupon book has been issued shall keep the speedometer of such motor vehicle in good working order."

Mr. J. H. Berry, Motor Vehicle Controller in the Department of Munitions and Supply, has suggested the following rules for the extending of the life of automobile batteries which applies to trucks and motor vehicles alike: 1. Don't let your battery run down; 2. Keep distilled water in the battery; 3. Have battery terminals and connections cleaned and kept free of corrosion; 4. Gadgets like fans, spotlights, cigar lighters, radios and heaters all use current and help overload the battery. Use them sparingly; 5. Vehicles not in use for a length of time should be placed on blocks and air pressure in tires reduced to a few pounds.
