## 20 Per Cent. Fewer Farms Keep Horses

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—Asoline is displacing horse-power on Canadian farms, says a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In 1921 85.26 per cent of the farmers kept horses and last year at the census, reports the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, 79.88 per cent kept horses, the actual number being 728 623 a decade ago and 582,019 now. The decrease is about 20 per cent.

However, the decrease in the number of horses on farms is from 3,451,782 to 3,115,582, or 9.74 per cent. In 1921 there was an average of 5.7 horses per farm reporting as compared with 5.3 in 1931. Of the 582,019 farms reporting horses in Canada, 273,151 or 46.93 per cent report three horses or fewer; 191,651 or 32.93 per cent from four to seven horses; 39,220 or 6.74 per cent from eight to nine horses; 49,902 or 8.57 per cent from 10 to 14 horses; 16,583 or 2.85 per cent from 15 to 19 horses, and 11,512 or 1.98 per cent report 20 or more horses.

## Excellent Races Sat. Afternoon

Lucky Lindy, Golden And Johnny Miles, Winners.

Matinee races staged by the Victoria Driving Club at the Charlottetown Driving Park on Saturday afternoon were favored with fine, clear, cold weather. The races were three in number with a half mile gentlemen's saddle race by members of the Charlottetown Riding Club as an added attraction.

The Free For All was the first race called and had three starters, the old rivals Lucky Lindy and Billy Cope with Volo Rico added. The first heat Billy Cope had the pole, Lucky Lindy tucked in behind, Volo Rico racing on the outside almost to the half. They were then a procession until rounding into the stretch when Lucky Lindy out-brushed Cope to the wire, Volo Rico back a length, third, in 2:11 1/2, extra good time for the cool day and raw wind.

Second heat, Billy Cope led to the home stretch when Lucky Lindy went by him easily. Volo Rico also got him about one hundred yards from the wire and finished second, time 2:11 1/2. After the heat it was found that Billy was suffering from a mild case of thumps or distress and Driver Power very wisely withdrew him from the race. As a matter of fact "Jimmie" arrived at a track a little late thinking that the Free For All would be the third class and in order to accommodate others started as arranged by the officials. Billy was not fully "blown out" hence the distress. He will be O.K. however, for October 10th.

The third heat Lucky Lindy set a very slow pace, Volo Rico tucked in behind hoping that he could out-brush Lindy. As they turned into the stretch for home Lindy uncorked a terrific brush and Volo could not get to him. The mile was slow, 2:21 1/2, the last eighth being timed in fourteen and three-fifths seconds.

Class B Pace. This had Peter Dawes, 2:12, Golden, 2:12, both trotters who had a corking duel at Montague the previous Saturday, with Peter emerging victorious. Grandma, 2:09 1/2, and The Willys, 2:13 1/2, both pacers and both racing minus hoppers. They got away on the third score with Peter Dawes at the pole, Grandma second, Golden third and The Willys fourth. At the turn Grandma had taken the lead and at the quarter Golden was racing on even terms. They raced that way almost to the three-quarter pole when Golden tucked in behind, Peter Dawes trailing him, The Willys fourth. Entering the stretch Golden pulled out, passed Grandma and looked like a winner, but Peter Dawes came with a great rush and nailed him about ten yards from the wire, winning in a hard drive. Golden second, Grandma third and The Willys fourth, time 2:13 1/2.

Second heat. They went away to a very good start, Golden took the lead at the turn, Peter Dawes tucked in behind. Both horses seemed to draw away from the others and

ridden by C. N. Bisset was a close second making a great try to get to the leader in the stretch. Pat Aubrey and Kentucky Lass finished a length apart with Pat getting third place. 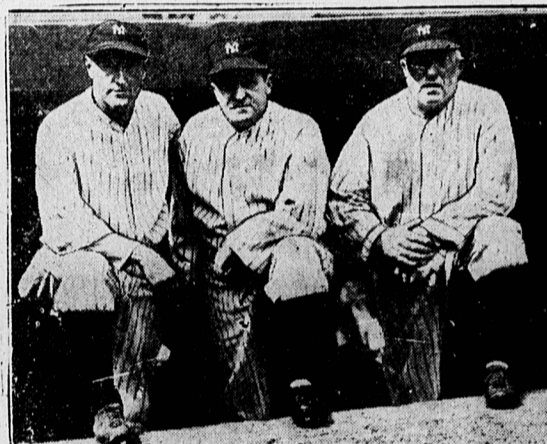
