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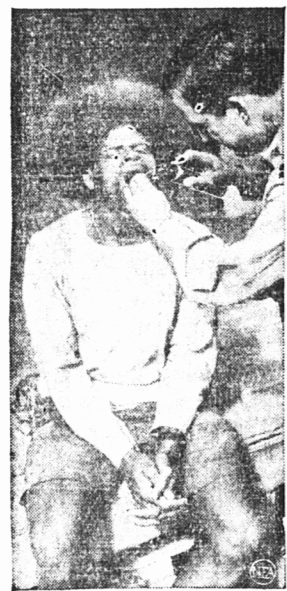


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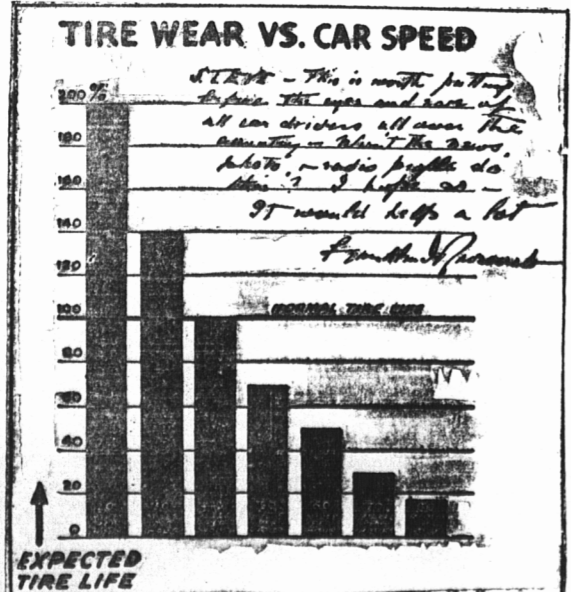

Messrs. William Brehaut and Robert Wood 21, both of Charlottetown, spent half an hour clinging to a capsized canoe in Charlottetown harbor yesterday afternoon before members of the City Police, who hailed a passing motor boat, rescued them. Apparently the young men were not in any great difficulty although people on shore who saw the boat upset thought they were in danger of drowning.

Both boys were wearing bathing suits and appeared to be intent on saving the canoe, police said. The tide was carrying them toward the shore. They were about 50 yards from Paoli's wharf when the canoe turned over. A resident along the water front alerted the police who rushed to one of the city wharves to get a rescue boat. At the time Mr. Charles McInnis, St. Peter's Island, was passing in a motor boat and they hailed him. It took only a few minutes to get around to the spot where the canoe had upset.

Sudden Death Ch'Town Man

Mr. Harry Crockett, 60-year-old Charlottetown man died suddenly at noon Saturday while at work. Death was to be almost instant. Coroner Dr. I. J. Yeo said, and an inquest was unnecessary.

The late Mr. Crockett was doing some carpenter work on a platform at the residence of Mr. Henry Benoit, Water Street, when he passed away. City Police were notified immediately and the Coroner was summoned.

The deceased was born in this city and lived here most of his life. He was a former employee of the Maritime Electric Company.

One son, Cpl. Ernest Crockett, R.C.A.F. survives and also a sister, Lulu Mrs. Clements Boston, Mass. His wife predeceased him by several years.

The funeral will be held this afternoon at two o'clock from the MacLean Funeral Home to Sherwood Cemetery for interment.

TRINITY CHURCH

Rev. Hugh Miller, D.D. pastor of Trinity United Church, who has just returned from the General Council of the United Church of Canada which has been in session at Belleville, Ont., preached at the morning and evening services of public worship, yesterday.

The able rendering of Glover O'Leary, "Thou my Light." The Church School met with encouraging attendance at 2.30 p. m. Following the evening service a period of song was held in the upper hall. It was indicated that October 4th, would be Rally Day both in Church service and in the Church School.

New Battleships Ready, Is Belief

LONDON, Sept. 20 (CP)—The naval correspondent of the Daily Herald, commenting upon remarks made by First Lord of the Admiralty A. V. Alexander in a speech at Sheffield today, wrote tonight that the British navy is ready for the newest 35,000-ton battleships, the Anson and the Howe, now are ready for action.

The correspondent so interpreted a statement by Alexander that British losses in capital ships, aircraft carriers and cruisers had been matched by new construction, a reiteration of statements in a speech of Sept. 3.

The correspondent estimated that around 200 destroyers, including the 50 over-age United States ships, had been added to the Royal Navy since the war began. He also said it was known that 200 corvettes are in service with the Royal Navy.

Jehovah's Witnesses Battle Townsfolk

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 20 (AP)—A thousand townspeople laid four stones to a Jehovah's Witnesses convention today, then stoned the meeting in a riot of bloody heads and club-swinging. Patriotic music blaring from a sound truck, spurred on the townspeople, who tossed each bomb, and rocks through windows of the convention building.

Four-hundred Jehovah's Witnesses, who as a matter of religious principle refuse to salute flags or engage in outward forms of patriotism, beat back the charge with staves of packing boxes. No one was seriously injured, but cut and bruised heads were plentiful.

Germans Claim 38 Freighters Sunk In Action

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts), Sept. 20 (AP)—The German high command stated today with the jubilant fanfare of triumph reserved for great victories, that 38 freighters of a British and American convoy bound for a northern Russian port, have been sunk in an air and submarine attack in Arctic waters.

In addition, it was alleged, three war vessels—a destroyer and two patrol boats—were sunk and two submarines had a displacement of other destroyers damaged so seriously by torpedoes that they probably were lost.

There was no confirmation of these claims from any other source. The first authoritative British statement was that "German claims regarding losses of a convoy to Russia are grossly exaggerated." Official quarters, silent while operations are still in progress, made no comment.
