A year ago the class of pork, which seems to be the only kind wanted at present, would be classed heavy fats, and the producer would receive from 4 to 1 cent per lb. less.—Middleton supplies milk for three factories, viz: Emerald, Tryon and Dunk River. Some of our farmers are getting tired of producing milk for 50 cents a hundred lbs., and in consequence a considerable number of beef cattle will be ready for the spring market.—Messrs. Charles Craig, John Craig and John Crawford have erected large barns the past summer. The contractors were Roberts Bros., G. McLean & Son, and W. Gardiner, respectively.—Mr. J. J. Wright and Miss J. A. Wright, have also made some improvements in their dwellings.—Mrs. W. J. Bradshaw had the misfortune a short time ago, to cut her arm very severely by falling against a window.—Mr. Ed. McDonald, our blacksmith for the past year, has gone to Boston. On the eve of his departure he was given a reception at the residence of Mr. Henry Roberts.

Mr. F. Croaken who has been very low for the past three weeks with inflammation of the lungs, is still I am sorry to say not much better.

Mr. P. Conolly's late importation of pure bred Yorkshires from Ontario are looking fine, and no doubt the community will share in the benefits to be derived by such an importation.
