—Messrs. W. H. McGregor and Fulton Simpson, of Lot 16 were in town on Tuesday in connection with the Seed Fair.—H.

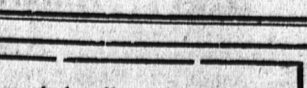

PRESENTATION TO CAPT. SENCABAUGH

The following address was presented to Capt. Sencabaugh of the "Stanley" by the officers and men of that steamer, at Pictou:

Captain Wm. Sencabaugh, Pictou, N.S.

Dear Capt. Sencabaugh.—On the eve of your severing your connection with us, the officers and members of the crew of the C.G.S. "Stanley" beg that you will accept the accompanying leather trunk as a small token of our esteem. While your command of the "Stanley" has not covered a great period it has nevertheless been amply sufficient to demonstrate your exceptional qualities of both head and heart. It is indeed with much pleasure that we learn that ultimately you are to be assigned to another of the Department's vessels, and to whatever ship or line of activities you may become attached, be assured that you have our very best wishes for success and happiness.

HEAVY STORMS OCCUR IN FRANCE

PARIS, Feb. 26.—Heavy snow storms have occurred throughout France with the exception of the far southern districts. Railroad traffic and telegraphic communication have been interrupted.

Lyons and other cities, which have been noted for mild climate, are covered with snow several inches deep for the first time in many years. In the Department of Doubs, the Savoy and Isere the snow in many places is three feet deep. Communication with Italy is retarded on account of heavy snowfalls in districts leading to the tunnels, and reports from Switzerland state that similar conditions prevail on the mount Gothard line.

In Paris, owing to the dearth of labor, the snow could not be cleared off the streets promptly, and it has interfered with the business traffic. In several quarters loaded trucks have been left standing in the streets as the drivers removed the horses when it was found that further progress could not be made.

"In many places dead Germans formed huge dams across the ravines, impeding the water in its downward course to the Meuse. Every now and then one of these dams gives away and the red stream swirls on, carrying hundreds of corpses with it."
