LIBELLER PUNISHED

He Sent a Fake Marriage Notice to Press

JAILED FOUR MONTHS

A Warning to all Who Send False News to the Newspapers.

JAILED FOR A FAKE MARRIAGE NOTICE.

OTTAWA, April 26.—(Special).—H. J. Cook of Britannia, who published a fake marriage notice was today given four months imprisonment for defamatory libel.

HISTORY OF THE CASE.

OTTAWA, April 23.—(Special).—At the Criminal Assizes to-day the case came up against H. J. Cook, of defamatory libel.

In February last a marriage notice appeared in the Morning Citizen newspaper to the effect that almost a year previous to the date the prisoner Cook had been married in Christ Church Cathedral here to Miss Audrey Graham, a member of a highly respectable family living in the township of Napanee, near Ottawa.

The libel consisted in the fact that no such marriage had been solemnized. The evidence proved most conclusively that Cook was the man who handed in the notice and paid for it.

The writing in the notice, when compared with correspondence signed with Cook's name was identical. The jury found the prisoner guilty.

CATTLE MARKET

By Mr. Saunders of Saunders & Newsom.

OUR MEAT IN SYDNEY.

Island Butchers Gradually Being Cut Out by the Imported Meats.

YESTERDAY a representatives of THE GUARDIAN had a talk with Mr. Saunders of the firm of Saunders and Newsom the well known butchers of this city.

Mr. Saunders stated that the prices asked by many farmers for cattle are unprecedented and as a result shippers of meat and live stock to the Sydney market find that Ontario is rapidly taking the trade which should be enjoyed by the people of this Province. It is to be regretted, said Mr. Saunders that cattle raisers of this Province cannot afford to sell at a price that will allow butchers to compete.

The dead meats of Ontario are being shipped in refrigerator cars and placed on the market in fairly good condition. Only yesterday, said Mr. Saunders, a large shipment was made of live stock—a shipment of three cars arrived in Sydney which of course will be used as the market demands.

Unfortunately in Prince Edward Island a large number of farmers never take the trouble to look up the markets of Montreal and other large centres and as a consequence fabulous prices and prices the buyers are unable to pay are asked. The holding of cattle for large prices will be a great advantage to shippers in Ontario and as a consequence a foothold will be established which will be difficult to eliminate at regular prices. Again, the season is advancing and prices will certainly be lower later on.

As many are aware the best cattle do not go to Sydney. A large per cent of the people are of the working-class and cannot afford to pay the large prices asked for first-class beef. The meat shipped from this Province is the product of small steers, cows and cheap cattle. Butchers are unable to buy good stock cheap enough to compete with the producers of Ontario.

Under the present condition of affairs the Sydney market is certainly slipping from our rightful grasp and becoming the property of the cattle raisers of Ontario.

Mr. Saunders in referring to the inconvenience because of the lack of steam boat accommodation on the Charlottetown-Crapaud route said that there are 200 cattle to be shipped to Charlottetown and if prompt action is not taken a very great loss must ensue to those who have cattle bought.
