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Legislative Assembly

Hon. J. D. MacIntyre: The matter is receiving the consideration of the government.

Mr. Larabee presented a Petition from Simon A. Murchison and others, praying for an Act to Incorporate The Polly Cemetery Company.

A bill embodying the power desired was referred to the committee on private bills.

Mr. Russell Clarke was, on motion of the Premier appointed chairman of the public accounts committee, Vice Judge Inman.

An Act to Amend the Succession Duty Act received its third reading and was passed accordingly.

The House then went into committee on supply, Mr. Horace Wright in the chair.

Hon. J. D. Stewart called the Premier's attention to the fact that he had asked for the expenditure of the Hilary Term of the Supreme Court.

The Premier: \$2,058.92 was the expenditure to date.

Mr. Stewart: What I was most concerned about was to find out the expenses of the Supreme Court this year to date. Mr. Stewart went on to say that there was a provision passed some little time ago providing for the employment of prisoners in the jail.

The Premier said he was not aware of the existence of such a regulation. He fully agreed that the prisoners should have employment. It had been the intention of the government to pass a regulation to that effect at the end of this session.

Mr. Stewart said that much useful work had been done in the Queen's County Jail, winter before last, in the way of keeping the roads in good condition and sawing wood, etc.

He was under the impression that such regulations did exist. He also wanted to know if any steps had been taken to improve the discipline in the jail which was said to be bad.

The Premier stated that the jailer claimed that during his (the jailer's) previous regime under the late Liberal government, bars had been placed over the window. These had been removed when the jailer returned, and he attributed the prisoners' escape to this. New locks had been ordered throughout, said the Premier, and he believed that the jail was in good condition. The assistant, too, had been told not to act with the prisoners.

Mr. Stewart thought that the condition as regards discipline revealed during the late court were not good. The bars were installed, he believed, in the early days of the Stewart Government, and before the present appointment of Mr. Stewart.

Dr. MacMillan then asked why the previous jailer had been dismissed and the present one given the position.

The Premier replied that the position was one of those whose appointments changed with the government.

Considerable discussion ensued on this, and on the responsibility for the escape of the prisoner, last fall. Mr. MacMillan said that the question was that of dismissing a competent man, and replacing him with an incompetent man, as shown by the escape of the prisoner.

Hon. J. P. MacIntyre claimed that when the present government came into office the jail was in "a dirty mess."

Hon. J. D. Stewart disputed this, and then the Minister of Public Works contradicted Mr. Stewart.

The Premier thought there was no good purpose in continuing the discussion, and asked them to get back to the estimates.

Dr. MacMillan asked if there had been a payment to Mr. G. W. Gardiner in 1927 or 1928 under fees and disbursements.

The Premier replied that there had been a payment in 1928 and that it was under the head of miscellaneous expenditure.

Mr. Stewart: Is it the intention of the government to pay the salaries of these three new Magistrates?

The Premier: It is the intention to pay their fees out of the prohibition act. They have not yet been appointed.

Mr. Stewart: Then, they will receive no salary, if the prohibition commission revenues are insufficient?

The Premier: I'm not saying that. They may not be appointed this year.

Mr. Stewart called attention to the increased item for maintenance of the jail.

The Premier said it was necessary as there were more prisoners in the jail now than in the past.

Mr. Stewart said he noticed large piles of gravel near the jail. Was it the intention of the government, as some people say, to build a wall about the jail?

The Premier said the government was considering putting an iron fence around it, like that around the Prince County Jail.

Hon. J. P. MacIntyre said the gravel in question was for the road.

Hon. J. D. Stewart enquired if the Government contemplated any repairs to the jail. He also asked why the young and competent returned soldier jailer of this jail had been dismissed and an elderly man with no overseas record put in his place. The grand jury had reported that the jail was in a dirty condition. Mr. Stewart did not approve of the appointment.

Mr. Scully explained that the dirt condition of the walls was due to a smoky flue. The jailer had kept the floors, furniture, etc., as clean as he could.

Mr. Stewart, in connection with the Agricultural estimates, asked what the arrangement is between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Department at the present time. He is a valuable and capable official, but he is now only giving part of his time to his duties in the department.

Hon. Mr. Lea said that as yet, there had been no change. The Secretary had not resigned. He was a very capable official, and had the fingers of the department at his fingers' ends. When telephoned for, he always came over and attended to any matter that was required of him.

Mr. Stewart asked for the names and salaries of the accountants and stenographers salaries.

Mr. Lea said the accountants were Miss Vinnicombe and the Secretary was Miss Nash.

Mr. Stewart then discussed the item of printing, stationery, etc. The item "etc" covered a multitude of items.

Mr. Lea replied that all the information he could give was, that the amount was the same as last year. He could see no possibility of a decrease.

Dr. MacMillan asked why there was a decrease in the estimate of Expenditures and Live Stock Judging.

Mr. Lea then explained that the item was decreased because the government was doing away with county fairs, and he went on to give his opinion, as previously expressed by him in his budget speech that such fairs were of very little use in the improvement of live stock.

Asked by Dr. MacMillan what fees he proposed eliminating, he replied that they had received no proposals at cutting out these grants except in Souris and Georgetown. The proposal was to give Georgetown \$1,000.00 and let Souris have a fair allowance.

The moneys for fairs were allotted as follows: Charlottetown, \$6,000.00; Georgetown, \$1,000.00; Amherst Winter fair, \$500.00.

Dr. MacMillan: So the Souris exhibition is eliminated, the Mt. Carmel exhibition is eliminated, the Summerside exhibition is eliminated, the Alberton exhibition is eliminated. And the smaller towns are being penalized? Why didn't he make his announcements in their proper place in the budget speech?

The Minister of Agriculture thinks he is the only one in this house competent in any way to deal with the matter. It is a debatable question as to whether these smaller exhibitions do not benefit the farmers nearly. When they get to larger places these small farmers meet in competition with cattle from large and wealthy owners who had all year to prepare them. When the Minister of Agriculture sets fit to cut out the money for these exhibitions we may say why are they sending this money to Amherst?

Mr. Harry MacLean said that Eastern King's was feeling this cutting off of the exhibitions rather keenly. They would not be placated by having a bull placed at their disposal in that part of the country. He protested against the discontinuance of the grant. The exhibition at Charlottetown was chiefly for specialists in live stock and for horse racing.

Mr. Adrian Arsenault on behalf of Egmont Bay, expressed his disapproval with the Minister's decision to stop the county fair grant. He considered that the fairs held there had done much to improve agriculture in that district. The arts and crafts of the ladies of the parishes about Egmont Bay had there been given a powerful incentive and assistance. It was a means of preserving the best traditions of the lives and customs of their Acadian ancestors.

Mr. Lea explained that he had taken the step of discontinuing the county fairs only after getting the opinions of the farmers' institutes in the matter. These opinions were not against doing away with them. He thought that Queens County had the best herds on account of the keen competition engendered. As to Amherst, we get more money back from Amherst fair, in prizes, than we give to it.

As to Mount Carmel, he could see no reason why Mt. Carmel should have a \$400.00 grant any more than Mt. Carmel (?). He commended the handicraft work exhibited there, but seeing that the school fairs were doing so well, he saw no reason for the county fairs. He thought Mt. Carmel might yet perhaps receive a small grant.

Mr. Arsenault again defended the grant to the Mt. Carmel exhibition. He hoped it would be continued.

Dr. MacMillan: Have the farmers of Fifteen Point been consulted in this matter?

Mr. Lea: I didn't say that. Dr. MacMillan enquired if the farmers of Egmont Bay and Mt. Carmel had given their consent through their institute.

Mr. Lea said he had not heard from them.

Dr. MacMillan. You don't infer from that that they agree with it? Mr. Lea: Well, they are one of the places which asked for the loan of a bull.

Mr. Stewart went on to give it as his opinion that the Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown was a special exhibit. But the small show is the one where the farmer receives practical training. He agreed with Mr. Arsenault about the exhibition at Mount Carmel. He had never been to an exhibition where so much interest was taken.
