lacking with some towns while in several cities the piles of debris thrown down by the shock yesterday morning had been only partly protected for victims. The greatest devastation fell on Tulsa, an industrial city of 38,000 population, about 150 miles south of the capital. Fifty seven bodies were in the improvised morgue there and unofficial reports of the death list would number 100 for the city alone.

Tulsa was virtually wiped out and persons arriving here today said that the damage would amount to a hundred million pesos (about \$12,000,000). Troops were enforcing martial law and took over most of the food supplies to prevent looting and were rationing it out. They blocked the efforts of speculators to take advantage of the emergency by jumping their prices.

A general discussion then took place and it was finally resolved. That this meeting be held in the committee and consider that same scheme could be worked out to help regulate the output and price and that local organizations should be formed to work in unison with the Central Committee.

Potato Growers Meet At Bedouin
A large and enthusiastic Potato Growers' Meeting took place on Monday evening in Central Bedouin Hall. Mr. D. L. MacDonald, who acted as chairman, opened the meeting by reading the report of the committee appointed at the meeting held in Charlottetown. He then gave an excellent address on the potato situation, as he sees it both from a producer and commercial traveller's viewpoint, and closed by asking the meeting to appoint delegates to attend the next meeting in Charlottetown.

Mr. Joy B. Hayes thought one of the reasons for the exceptionally low price this fall was that so many farmers grew more than they could store, thus dumping such large quantities on the market in a shorter time than they could be absorbed. He was, he said, the first man ship a carload of seed grown by himself from Albany and gave several of his experiences in Long Island, U.S.A., and Montreal in selling potatoes. One of the first cars he took to Montreal of table stock he was unable to sell because that all the potatoes that came from Prince Edward Island tasted of fish.
